October 8, 1998, Judy and Dennis Shepard were awakened in the middle of the night in Saudi Arabia, where Dennis works, by a telephone call no parent should ever have to receive. What they heard changed their lives forever. Their eldest son, Matthew, was in a coma after having been brutally attacked-because he was gay. On October 12, Matthew passed away. Judy Shepard's talk will be an opportunity to hear, support, and mourn wth her, Shepard's visit is part of a campus-wide campaign called "Fostering a Caring Community." As part of this campaign, a student production of The Laramie Project, a play that explores the impact Matthew Shepard's death had on the people of Laramie, Wyoming is tentatively scheduled for March 19-21, 2004. PIIN Accomplishments - 2003

Public Education Task Force

Pittsburgh Public Schools administration pledged to:

- Remove cultural bias from the student Code of Conduct.
- Revise the Social Studies and History curricula to include African-American and Muslim contributions to the United States.
- Explore extending the African-Centered Academy through grade twelve.

Economic Equity Task Force

PIIN secured \$150,000 initial investment from Allegheny County to board up or demolish abandoned houses in the City of Wilkinsburg.

Civil Rights Task Force

PIIN secured a public reporting process from the City of Pittsburgh's Office of Municipal Investigations on citizen complaints against police officers.

Youth Recreation Task Force

PIIN engineered a partnership with the Pittsburgh Public Schools to provide children with Internet access in recreation centers located in low-income neighborhoods. (*But unfortunately the recreation centers were shut down by the Mayor's office due to lack of funds, postponing computer installation*).

Welcoming Congregation Committee

The Welcoming CongregationCommittee hosted a very successful Town meeting on December 7th, in which we reviewed our progress toward becoming a Welcoming congregation, and how it relates to the Religious Education program in our church. It was clear that there was uniformly strong support for our current RE diversity curriculum and the welcoming congregation effort. There was also consensus

that the OWL (Our Whole Lives) human sexuality curriculum would only be a voluntary, supplementary RE curriculum, at parental discretion.

Chris Priano announced that he will be stepping down as the Welcoming Committee chair, due to his job relocation. Many thanks to Chris for his excellent leadership of this committee.

At the January 4th meeting we will introduce new co-chairs Maureen McHugh and Matt Mathis and review the input from Town meeting. We will formulate plans for the next several months to detect any lingering unwelcoming in our congregation and to complete the formal Welcoming Congregation process. There will also be a discussion of appropriate outreach to GLTB people in the surrounding communities.

Aesthetics Committee

The regular meeting of the aesthetics committee was held on December 21 after the service. Jane Longdon brought 4 revised sketches submitted by Adrienne Heinrich to fit altered format of 8 ft. x 8 ft. The committee concluded that all four sketches were satisfactory and that we would ask Adrienne to make the choice herself.

The committee selected Jean Robl to be the liaison with artist for the selection of materials for the work.

The Committee recommended that Adrienne construct the large piece and a cross be included in the work with the same level of emphasis as the symbols for other religions.

The committee also recommends that a complementary piece for the lecturn and a banner (to be taken to General Assembly) be constructed by church members based on Adrienne's design.

Retreat Saturday January 10 was explained by Maureen McHugh. Plans for the afternoon: each committee will have table for a visual display of accomplishments and plans. Aesthetics will have a display. In addition, a comment sheet will be developed by Jane Longdon. As a follow-up, a sign will be prepared by Andy Manhardt inviting interested people to our regular monthly meeting January 18.

Since the tapestry finished by Adrienne will cost \$3000, the committee discussed ways to raise the money. It was decided to have a rummage sale in March and a Crafts Show in May.
