Sunday, February 1, 10:30 AM- "The African American Soul"

February is African American History Month. In observance of that, **Dr. Waun** will present another musical program using spirituals to reflect on African American spirituality, especially that of the slave.

Sunday, February 8, 10:30 AM "The Gender Knot"

This service will be led by member Maureen McHugh, a social psychologist and gender specialist, and is based on the book, The Gender Knot by Allan Johnson, a sociologist at Hartford College. His book is acclaimed because he describes patriarchy in terms we can understand, and shows both men and women how to participate in changing gender inequalities. Like a knitter, Johnson works to untangle the knot of patriarchy by gently shaking the entire skein until all the threads are loosened, and each of the threads is analytically clear. In advance of Valentine's Day, McHugh will follow the thread of adult (heterosexual) romantic relationships, and examine how our relationships are impacted by our cultural legacy of male domination.

Sunday, February 15, 10:30 AM- "Haunted by the little boxes"

The President of the Pittsburgh Transsexual Support Group (a UU!) has graciously agreed to share her family experience, good and bad. With this she will provide personal insight into the importance of family, friends and congregation accepting and welcoming transgender as well as its gay and

lesbian members. Please join us for this special Valentine's Day program to help us expand our definition of love.

Sunday February 22, 10:30 AM- "Henry David Thoreau"

UU history often traces one of its roots to the Transcendentalists of New England, and particularly to Ralph Waldo Emerson. This service, led by Brien Palmer, will focus on another--and perhaps even more influential--member of this group: Henry David Thoreau. Thoreau was brilliant, independent, original, difficult, poetic, nature-loving, outspokenly political, stubborn, and insightful--clearly a UU. Come hear how this person influenced literature, social justice, philosophy, Mahatmas Gandhi, environmentalism, nonviolence, Martin Luther King, and some of the core UU principles.

Sunday February 29, 10:30 AM-

"Contemporary Philosophy and the Meaning of Life: Existentialist Spirituality"

Contemporary philosophers question the ability of human beings to grasp absolute truths regarding values and meaning. The existentialists, in particular, move the emphasis for finding meaning away from absolutes to the choices and perspectives of the individual. This talk will investigate the ways in which existentialists make sense of meaning and spirituality in an ambiguous world. Presented by Dr. Bill Pamerleau, Associate Professor of Philosophy at the University of Pittsburgh at Greensburg.

Sunday, March 7, 10:30 AM- "I, The Crone"

March is "Women's History Month". In recognition of this, Dr. Waun will offer a program on the "crone". Is this third face of the "mother" archetype to be celebrated or eschewed? As Dr. Waun celebrates her own passage into crone-hood in March, she will reflect on the meaning and role of the crone today and in times past.

We've just celebrated the oldest of all the holidays, first observed in Babylon about 4000 years ago. A tradition of this season is the making of New Year's resolutions, and in 2004 I invite you to resolve to learn about something new through East Suburban Unitarian-Universalist Church. Learning is important, because it is the single most effective way to address fear.

"Fear leads to anger, anger leads to hate, and hate leads to suffering." Yoda

This morning our Coming of Age youth and their mentors visited the Islamic mosque in Oakland. It was a wonderful experience, and the woman hosting our group was eloquent and very open. We learned a lot about Muslim beliefs, including the conditions under which non-believers are destined for hell-fire. We learned about this in an objective way, and I truly believe most of us attending have little fear of Muslims, and less of experiencing the Islamic hell-fire.

We sometimes offer Sunday programs where individuals can learn by seeing, hearing and talking with individuals representing groups that most of us know little about. Sunday, February 15th is one of these! The President of the Pittsburgh Transsexual Support Group (PTSG) has graciously agreed to tell about her family experience, good and bad. With this she wishes to provide an understanding of the importance of family, friends and congregation accepting and welcoming transgender as well as its gay and lesbian members.

I liked this extract from the sermon a UU minister in Nashville gave a couple of years ago on Valentine's Day: "Reading and hearing the voices of people who are transgender has truly opened my heart in ways I didn't expect. I feel a little bit of fear falling away. I feel the beginning of more radical openness to others. I feel parts of myself coming back to life. As I open myself to the possibility of compassion and love for people who are different from me (and not so different), my own capacity to feel love and compassion for myself expands."

Each of us is on a path of growing, learning and changing, and it is great to be on this path with you.
