The President shall preside at all meetings of the Church and of the Board, but shall not vote at these meetings except to break a tie. The President is an ex-officio member of all committees & shall sign all agreements except those pertaining to the office of Treasurer.

- Vice-President (currently held by Maureen McHugh). Perform duties and exercise powers of the President in the President's absence and shall be coordinator among the Standing Committees.
- Program Chair (currently held by Kate Codd-Palmer & Jean Robl). Assemble and chair the Program Committee which will be responsible for setting Sunday programming goals and arranging for their implementation.

Elections are held at the ESUUC Annual Meeting in June. The elections are conducted by use of a secret ballot. If there is no objection, and only a single slate has been presented, the vote may be conducted by voice vote.

We are looking for good people to help us go forward into the future. We encourage you to stand for one of the available positions. (We may even nominate you ourselves!) You will find help and support from the current position-holder, the Board, and the standing committee members.

Council of Committee Chairs

A Council of Chairs Meeting after the service on Sunday, February 8.

Each of the committee chairs briefly outlined the committee's plans for the rest of the year to verify that there were no significant schedule conflicts.

The development of a church handbook was then discussed and each committee chair was asked to provide a description that includes both your mission statement (if you have one), your long term and short term goals, and the "day to day" activities of your committee for publication in the handbook. Methods of minimizing const such a publishing the handbook on the web were discussed as well as the possibility of accepting advertising from members to defray its cost.

Each committee was also asked to send a budget for their committee for next year to Cathy Serventi by March 1st that includes:

1. Operating Budget Items – these are ongoing expenses necessary to run the church

2. Any Capital items (one time expenditures you would like to make) for the upcoming year that will be voted on at the annual meeting

3. Long term expenses that we need to start contributing towards, such as building maintenance, that won't necessarily be spent every year but that also won't roll over every year. We are essentially creating a savings account for expenses that we know will be coming up every year.

Aesthetics Committee

Rummage Sale

The Aesthetics Committee will sponsor a Rummage sale on Saturday, March 27 to raise funds for improvements to the sanctuary.

Congregational Meeting

A Congregational Meeting was held Sunday, February 22 at 12:15 PM to present the Aesthetics Committee's recommendations for the sanctuary décor and to vote on the following 2 resolutions.

1. I vote to accept the Aesthetic Committee's recommendation to commission Adrienne Heinrich to construct a tapestry for the front of the sanctuary.

2. I vote to accept the Aesthetics Committee's recommendation to accept in principle the Long Range Plan developed by Norman Harai, Architect, to up-grade the decor of the sanctuary.

The first resolution was amended as follows: Adrienne Heinrich will be commissioned after 75% of the needed funds are pledged.

The first resolution passed by a vote of 24 to 2 and the second by a vote of 22 to 4.

A short discussion was also held on the possibility of the Aesthetics committee sponsoring a craft show at the church in May. The proposal was generally well received by the congregation members present.



"Later On" is Now Upon Us-

This month marks the end of the second year we have occupied our new building. I wonder—how long should we be referring to our "new building"? Perhaps as we start our third year here, we will begin to shift that reference.

Something else is happening as we make this more and more our home. Some of us remember when we were involved in the purchasing process, that the visionaries in the congregation were wondering how we would deal with the thought of outgrowing this building. But we thought, "What a great problem to have". And we knew we would have to tackle this sometime—later on.

Well, folks, later on is now upon us. The church growth experts say that when the sanctuary, the religious education space and the parking lot are all being used to 80% of capacity, we have hit our ceilings to growth, making it necessary to strategize for the future. We have been at more than 80% on several occasions, so we really are in a wonderful growth spurt.

Your Board and pastor have foreseen this eventuality and have appointed a Strategic Growth Planning Task Force that will do the necessary research and reporting to address options for the future. We hope to have some concrete ideas in place by the Annual Meeting in June.

Isn't it exciting to be part of a church that is growing so fast? We had been predicting such a challenge, and now it is here. Our job is to greet it with enthusiasm and positivity, for it truly is a wonderful affirmation of our ministry and presence in this community. If you have ideas to share, we are eager to hear of them!



mUUsings from the President

In the past 48 hours we sponsored two major activities at our church building supporting most of our UU principles! The inherent worth and dignity of every person was celebrated in both the Friday night performance of the Tibetan monks, and the President of the Pittsburgh Transsexual Support Group's program Sunday morning. The people of Tibet are being suppressed and killed by China, and Transgender individuals are suppressed and minimalized by the government and many religious groups in the United States.

We seek to promote Justice, equity and compassion in human relations; we can only do this intelligently when we take the time to learn about groups that are not being treated fairly! The monks shared the story of the Tibetan people's persecution, and Wendi Miller told us her own story of shame, denial, and finally self-discovery and assertion, in a culture that officially lists most categories of transgender as medical and psychological disorders.

Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations is another one of our principles. The Tibetan monks live their lives in an advanced spiritual state, which we can learn from, and appreciate by witnessing their meditations and chanting. It is fairly easy to "accept" them, for the few hours we spend in their presence. Ancient and native cultures around the world believed that individuals who experienced both female and male gender traits were spiritually advanced. It is a little harder for us to accept individuals from our own culture, speaking our own language, who flaunt traditional gender roles – they're "different". But taking the time to listen to, meet and support these people truly supports spiritual growth in us and our congregation.

It was an honor and a pleasure to host these two very different groups in our new church building. In reality, the goals of both are the same – world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all. I trust that the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part will continue to give us opportunities like these to help make a positive difference in the world.
