RE Events:

COA Class and their Mentors Attend Trinity African Methodist Episcopalian Church

On Sunday, March 14, we visited our third church for this year. Trinity is a small church located in the Hill District. The Rev. Helen Burton took time to meet with us before the service and give us the churches history along with outlining their beliefs. She and her congregation made us feel very welcome and invited us all to come back anytime.

This service was, again, very different from the others we have attended, but warm and sincere and uplifting. Several of the congregation's youth participated in the service through expressive dance. Clearly, this was a supportive and caring community. I for one am glad to have had the chance to join them. Our next visit and last visit before the COA Ceremony, is tentatively scheduled for May 2. We plan to visit one of the local Hindu temples. Details will be sent out to all participants once the visit is confirmed. (We hope to be able to schedule one more visit after that, for those who are interested, to participate in a Pagan service.)

COA Service Project

On Saturday, April 24, our COA participants will be visiting New Hope Church, a store front UU Church in Cleveland. This is an urban church with a service mission that provides help to AIDS victims, abused women and children, and does whatever it can for the people in its community. Among other things, the church provides a community garden which helps to provide food for participants. Weather permitting, we will help the good people of New Hope get the garden ready for planting. If the weather is not so good, we are likely to assist in painting and possibly general maintenance at a nearby school that New Hope supports.

RE Sponsored Intergenerational Game Night

On Friday evening, April 16, we are sponsoring a game night and invite everyone to attend. This is not a fund-raiser, this is just for fun. We invite you to come, bring a game you like if you want to, munchies and/or drink to share if you care to, but please, come and join us for this All Church event. We will have a sign up sheet posted on the bulletin board. Please sign up if you are thinking about coming. No obligation, we would just like to have an idea of how many people to plan for.

RE Sponsored Intergenerational Chess Tournament

On Saturday, May 15, we are sponsoring a chess tournament for all ages. Anyone who is interested, please sign up on the sheet that will be posted on the RE bulletin Board. We need to have an advance idea of who will attend so we can pair people up before the tournament starts. If anyone has a chess set they are willing to lend us for the day, that would also be appreciated. Please just let us know.

Teacher Recruitment

Yes, it's that time of year again! We are already deep in planning for next years RE program. With the completion of the Coming of Age program and the children involved in it moving on to youth group we will be making a change in next years classroom set up. The new set up will look like this:

- 1. Nursery birth to 4
- 2. Early Program Kindergarten through second grade
- 3. Elementary second or third grade through fifth grade
- 4. Middle School 6th grade through 8th grade

Youth Group - Leona will be our Youth Group Advisor. Right now the thought is that the Youth Group will meet on an evening and we will not have a formal Sunday School program for them. We will need folks for the other 4 groups.

The age ranges may change slightly between now and September, depending on how many kids we have signed up for next year, but this gives you an idea of the ranges we are talking about.

For the 2004 to 2005 year, our overall RE theme will be centered on diversity. In keeping with this theme, we have selected the following curriculum:

Pre-School - We Are Many We Are One - Offers children the grounding of a religious community and tradition, along with the freedom to discover and express their uniqueness. The underlying theme throughout is anti-bias and multi-cultural education, which celebrates diversity and interdependency. This is a year long program

Elementary - *Rainbow Children*: A Racial Justice and Diversity Program - this is an anti-bias, prodiversity curriculum that addresses racial and ethnic prejudice while affirming the inherent worth and beauty of the child, the family, the community, and the diversity of humankind. Beginning with the Untied Nations Declaration of the Rights of the Child, it celebrates the differences and commonalties of all people. This is a part year program.

Second program for this age group will be *In Our Hands: A Peace and Social Justice Program*. In this program, children explore peace and fairness through stories, discussions, and activities. Participants learn constructive ways of resolving conflict and promoting peace in their own lives. They learn to see their connections to the larger community, to the natural world, and to the Unitarian Universalist peace and justice heritage.

Middle School - *In Our Hands* - This particular curriculum is available in two formats - one for the younger and one for the older kids. Our plan is to use it in both classes. This is a part year curriculum. For the second part, we will use *Race to Justice - A racial Justice and Diversity Program*. Promotes self-esteem, reduces prejudice, and affirms racial, ethnic, cultural, and familial diversity. Directly addresses the definition and nature of racism in age-appropriate ways, engages participants in hands-on activities, and builds community.

We also plan to provide some simple materials, books, etc. that can be used for the Nursery kids. We recognize that most of the children in the nursery are toddlers as opposed to babies and, although we have no plan to do a formal Sunday school curriculum with them, we do hope to begin introducing UU ideas through the use of stories, coloring and simple games.

We will start the new year with a short program on families that all classes will participate in. For these sessions we plan to show a video called "That's a Family", and work with a curriculum called "Celebrating Families". Both the movie and the curriculum deal with varying family structures and the need to give children a sense of belonging, a sense that their families are precious, as real as any other. Explores my family, kinds of families, what's special about my family and what makes a family.

Another change we plan to make this year is to ask one teacher at each level to act as a sort of head teacher for the group. We find that we are being pulled in so many different directions on any given Sunday that we are not always able to give everyone the attention we want to provide. We hope that by making this change each teaching group will be more cohesive and will have a go-to person readily available at those times when we are not. Dan and I will still plan to be there and available, we just thought that with the growth we have experienced it was important to take our planning to the next level so we are prepared for the future.

In the past year, to date, our program has grown by 1/3. If we grow that much again next year we will be glad we did this much planning!

Our Whole Lives Training

OWL is an age appropriate sexuality program sponsored by the UUA. Their are 5 parts to it: K-1st grade, 4th - 6th grades, Junior High, Senior High, and Adult.

Over this past winter we had two volunteers, Matt Mathis and Susan Goodis, attend OWL training for K-1 and 4th - 6th grades. Thanks to their willingness, we will be able to offer OWL training for one or possibly both, of these age groups in the 2004 to 2005 year. We will be holding a parents meeting to discuss the program and give you the opportunity to ask whatever questions you may have before making the decision on whether or not to sign your children up for the program. We plan to offer the training in addition to the program that will be available during Sunday service. The OWL training varies in length with the age group it addresses. Please watch for more information and announcements at service on the where and when for the parents meeting, where we hope to answer all of your questions.

Summertime Blues?

During the summer with vacations and travel for so many members of our congregation we find our attendance in the RE classes drops off dramatically. The RE Committee has therefore decided not to offer a formal summer program this year. We would however like to have at least one adult available to be with the children who do attend on any given Sunday. We are therefore respectfully requesting that anyone who can commit to spending one week-end over the course of the whole summer helping out in RE. Don't be surprised if you see Dan running around with a clip-board seeking recruits! Seriously, if you can help, it would be more than just appreciated.

As subtle as we have tried to be, you have no doubt guessed that this is all leading up to something, and you are right! As part of our planning we are asking you to let us know if you are interested in teaching next year. We hope you are! Please get back to us as soon as you can. We need to know the following:

Are you interested in teaching next year?

If yes, what level are you interested in?

Would you be willing to be the head teacher for the group?

We do require all participants in the program to obtain (if they don't have it already) and provide copies of their Criminal Record Check and Child Abuse Clearances. If you have already given us this information, you will not need to do it again this year.

If you do have an interest in teaching, please get back to us as soon as you can, since we are in the planning stages for next year right now. Our goal is to have the best RE program we can possibly create, but we cannot do it alone.

Thank you all for your help and your continued support of our children.

Soulforce is Coming to Pittsburgh

We are Invited to Participate

Soulforce is a national, non-denominational advocacy group that addresses the injustices and abuses in mainstream churches regarding GLBT persons. Founded in 1998 by The Rev. Mel White (author of *Stranger at the Gate*) this e-organized and headquartered group (www.soulforce.org) rallies at gatherings and national conventions of mainstream churches—doing acts of peaceful, nonviolent, civil disobedience based solidly on principles developed by Gandhi and King.

Soulforce is coming to Pittsburgh to peacefully demonstrate at the United Methodist General Conference April 27-May 7, because of that church's stand against gay ordination (you may have read about the Rev. Karen Dammann trial recently), holy unions and GLBT life in general. Direct action training and activity will be held near the end of the second week, and all people of faith, including Unitarian Universalists, are encouraged to participate.

Dr. Waun has been part of Soulforce for four years, participating in three demonstrations, being arrested twice, and spending two days in jail in Orlando. What impressed her deeply was the fact that she once met a group of Unitarian Universalists led by The Rev. Marny Harmony (niece of our own church member Ruth Schultz) as they once stood with Soulforce demonstrators at the Southern Baptist Convention, to provide support and affirmation—as a matter of principle, knowing that wherever there is oppression, no one is truly free.

We have an opportunity next month to stand for that principle. We all know persons who have suffered at the hands of a mainline church because of their sexual orientation. Now we can show our solidarity with those who work tirelessly to make a difference. Soulforce hopes that over time, by promising to show up at every national convention of churches that disapprove of GLBT persons, slowly but surely they will help American churches to open their doors and arms to all people, not just straight ones. Every major emancipation in our culture has come about through demonstration and civil disobedience. Opening all church doors to GLBT persons is the next emancipation. Elections are held at the ESUUC Annual Meeting in June. The elections are conducted by use of a secret ballot. If there is no objection, and only a single slate has been presented, the vote may be conducted by voice vote.

Pastor's Column

There's Power in Sharing the Flame

Did you ever experience a time when some deep injustice triggered a flame inside your soul that continues to burn in a sort of "righteous indignation" around a particular issue? This happened to me most powerfully when I listened to the stories of gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender persons over my years of ministry. After awhile, as this inner flame of mine grew stronger, I became an "accidental advocate" and wrote a book challenging the mainstream church for its role in perpetuating the negative, sometimes abusive attitudes we hold in our society about GLBT persons. I wrote that the mainstream church was the primary cause of this cultural situation and so the mainstream church must take responsibility for correcting it.

There is a national group called Soulforce that was founded on this very concept. It calls all those who experience that inner flame of injustice to join together in a persistent force for bringing the mainstream churches into accountability. This is the meaning of the term "Soulforce". I devote some of my personal, non-church time to Soulforce and I invite you to see what this group will be doing next month in Pittsburgh to help open all church hearts and doors to GLBT people. There is an article about Soulforce below. If a flame burns within you as you think about your GLBT friends who have been alienated from their church because of their sexual orientation, and you would like to join with others to do something powerful and meaningful from that place deep inside, please talk with me about it. 412-731-2834 revmom@pitt.edu
