## In Honor of Walt Courtley

Walt Courtley planned his memorial service in Greenville on Sat. over the last 6 months of his life. "Celebrate and let it be dance!" were part of his instructions as indeed his life was a dance. "Let it Be a Dance" is also the title of a hymn with words by poet Ric Masten, a favorite of Walt's, with whom he was in touch by email over the last few months.

Walt filled many roles within ESC over the years, including President in 1974-75, program chair and participant on the committee when we hired our first full time minister. He started a men's tennis group and a Men's Retreat for Ohio-Meadville District. He took my 13 year old to the tennis court when he was in his late 60's, and contrary to Greg's expectations for "this old man" beat him soundly. He went white water rafting with teenagers Brian Lilly and David Cook and David's dad Charlie in about the same time frame. He was an enthusiastic greeter of visitors and encouraged others to consider serving on the board or committees for OMD so that including Walt, Steve Fowler and Sibyl McNulty, ESC has had so far three

presidents of the OMD Board and a goodly share of people serve on the Summer Institute Planning Committee and in other key roles. For many years he participated in guiding ESC at board meetings along with his wife Mildred.

Mildred and Walt moved 9 years ago to the retirement center of St. Paul Homes in Greenville, PA for which Walt raised capital funds as a young man. Still he kept up his UU and East Suburban interest. He served a four-year term as a trustee to the national Unitarian Universalist Association board while based at the UU Church of Youngstown, OH with duties as liaison to the young people. In that capacity, he showed up one evening at Summer Institute with bright green hair. When asked if it would wash out, he said he didn't know but he'd tell me in the morning. Walt's hobby was wood working and we benefited in our new building from the gifts of our podium, hymnal cart, worship table and three small tables in the back corner the he made to the specifications of the Aesthetics Committee.

Walt was still concerned about deficit spending and unrealistic dues collection projections in the OMD budget right before this year's Annual Meeting. It would be a worthy memorial to make sure there is fiscal balance in next year's budget. There were at least 25 people at his memorial service who had known Walt through East Suburban Church, including Tam, Minh and Cuong Nguyen, the Vietnamese family sponsored by ESC when they immigrated to Pittsburgh in 1975, who came from Boston and Baltimore.

Walter J. Courtley died on May 16, 2004 from cancer at the age of 81. We celebrate his life in the congregation of East Suburban Unitarian Universalist Church and the joyous contribution he made to so many of us.
