# mUUsings from the President

We just finished our first program of the August "Emerson salon" series, and it brings to mind some of the great ideas this bastion of UU and American history advocated. A key element in many of Ralph Waldo Emerson's writings is that an individual should learn about themselves and their tru natue first, before setting out to change or help the world. This principle could be applied to our Congregation, in one way, with our Welcoming Congregation process – we are learning about some of the wonderful diversity of other individuals. It is important to apply ourselves conscientiously to this task, for although many of us are a little older, and certainly have seen a lot, everyone can learn more, and most gain valuable insights when looking at things from different perspectives.

After we have finished this process, it will be time to open our hearts and decide how our particular congregation might be able to help the world. AS one can read from the newspaper headlines, our country is embroiled in a controversy – well several of them actually, but the relevant one here is over gay marriage. The UU church was an early and strong supporter of this, but other religions and certainly many individuals are struggling with it. While in Gettysburg this summer, I discovered that a prominent position of many mainstream religions prior to the Civil War was that slavery was a Divine institution, and that Lincoln was suggesting heresy to ban it!

Which brings me to another element of Emerson's writings, that evil is the absence of good. It is up to us, as individuals and as a church, to encourage and spread goodness. Let's learn together, then work as individuals and together to help address the challenges that face our country today, as Lincoln did in his time.

# Pittsburgh Interfaith Impact Network Public Action Meeting Oct. 9

PIIN is gearing up for another public action meeting on Thursday, Oct. 9 at the Monumental Baptist Church in Pittsburgh. At our February 20 Public Action meeting we had nearly 1000 people including several from our congregation, calling on public officials for commitments in specific areas. We succeeded in gaining some concessions and are using Oct. 9 as an accountability follow-up to these actions, to report on progress and to make sure the public officials are still on track with our negotiated projects. We are expecting at least 500 people to come to this meeting, so we hope that several people from ESUUC will want to car pool over.
