Sunday, November 7, 10:30AM – "Radical Neighborliness"

**Rev. Dr. Renee Waun** will reflect on what it means to live in an interdependent community with people who are very different from us. This applies to so many categories of "difference" but perhaps most relevant in the political arena in the aftermath of a close election. It can feel "radical".

And it all begins with a beauty pageant.

Sunday, November 28, 10:30AM – "How to be Nobody"

Nancy Fitzgerald, Commissioned Lay Leader, says, "I affirm that I believe in God and want to experience that daily—by my understanding, I'm a theist and a mystic. I am currently working on being aware of my ego so I can let it go and claim my one Self. This talk draws from an article by Rev. Jon Mundy from Miracles Magazine. A Course in Miracles is it's inspiration and mine. We end with some humorous thoughts."

Sunday, December 5, 10:30AM- "Crossing Spiritual Boundaries"

# Dr. Waun to Address Seminary Class

On Tuesday, Nov. 2 Rev. Renee Waun will be offering a presentation to a class at the Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, defending the practice of ordaining homosexuals. She will be facing off with Prof. Robert Gagnon, author of *The Bible and Homosexual Practice*, a book meant to argue against the acceptance of homosexuality. Rev. Waun's book *MORE Than Welcome: Learning to Embrace Gay*, *Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgendered Persons in the Church* defends the practice of all forms of sexual variance within the life of the church, so the debate should prove to be lively.

### Movie Night

On **Friday, November 19** we will be sponsoring our second movie night of the year. The church will be open by **7:30 pm** with show time at 8:00 pm. No dinner is planned for this event, but snacks are welcome! Please join us for a night of entertainment, camaraderie, and fun! We will be showing two movies:

**For the Adults** - We had hoped to show the movie "Cry Baby", however it has not been released. Instead, we will show "**Orlando**", rated PG-13, 93 minutes long. Described as:

Breathtaking and practically nondiscursive, Sally Potter's audacious *Orlando* overcomes some dodgy performances and a narrative structure that could most generously be described as "loose" to emerge as a haunting, discussion-provoking trans-historical and transsexual drama. Commanded never to age by Queen Elizabeth (played with surprisingly little camp by legendary cross-dresser Quentin Crisp), the title character

becomes immortal; we then follow Orlando through 400 years of dreamlike British history. Midway through the film, Orlando changes genders--to Potter's immense credit, the transformation is handled with little fanfare and no explanation. Tilda Swinton, in the lead role, is far more convincing as a woman than as a man, and even during the film's latter half, her impassivity and lack of expression can be annoying. Potter encourages Swinton to play to the camera, and the resulting asides and glances askance can be amusing, but often seem purposeless, or even arch. Nevertheless, the willful idiosyncrasy and understatement of the film never quite capsize the project, and once you give yourself over to the filmmaker's logic, the panoramic sweep of the cinematography (remarkable sets include an aristocratic skating party on the frozen Thames during the Great London Frost of 1603, a stunning tent-caravan in Central Asia, and countless fastidious boudoirs and interiors) will surely keep you enraptured. *Orlando* is no Merchant-Ivory production, no prissy, forgettable period piece; this film has teeth, and it may bite ferociously when you least expect it to.

#### For the Kids - "No More Baths". Here is the description of this movie:

"Am I my brother's keeper?" to 10-year-old Keagan, this isn't a question but a way of life. After learning to help others by watching his parents work as legal-aid attorneys in his youth, Keagan puts his lessons to good use by watching out for his aging neighbor Jake. Years ago, after a fire took his family, Jake opened up his home and heart to the children of Glenwood Springs who come to play on his lot each day. When Jake gets in the way of a greedy developer, government bureaucrats are content to push him aside, but they don't anticipate Keagan McPhie. Keagan organizes the Glenwood Springs Kids Corp into a powerful force of peaceful protest to help Jake and remind adults of their responsibility to a friend in need.

#### **SUNDAY REFRESHMENTS**

### What to Buy (plan on about 30 adults and 15 children of various ages)

-juice

-whatever kind of snack you would like to serve (examples are: nuts, bagels, muffins, fruit, vegetables, breads, cheese, crackers, cookies, mini quiches). It's really your decision to serve what you want or like.

### Feel free to use the oven

### **Setting Up**

The table in the community room should have:

Coffee mugs

Styrofoam hot cups

Creamers

Sugar/sweetener

Plate/spoon to stir coffee

Assorted teas

Paper plates

**Napkins** 

Juice cups

HOT WATER—there is a smaller/older coffee pot, fill half way with water and plug into outlet near the serving table in the community room. Start hot water before service begins

COFFEE---start coffee around 11am (takes about 1 minute per cup to brew). Use same outlet in the community room

To make 35 cups use 2 1/4 cups of coffee

To make 30 cups use 2 cups of coffee

To make 25 cups use 1¾ cups of coffee

# Unless it is around a holiday or special event 25 or 30 cups of coffee is plenty

Basin of hot water—In an effort to be nicer to the planet we are trying to use coffee mugs rather than paper cups. Fill the white dish basin in the sink with hot "soapy" water. Individuals using mugs can then rinse their own mug after using

### <Print and/or Save for your reference>

### Clean Up

### Wash coffee pot and put away

Empty coffee pot with hot water and put away

Put away unused cups, plates, napkins

Put away teas, sugar, creamers

Wash, dry and put away any bowls, dishes or silverware you may have used

Nudge all those who used ceramic mugs to wash and rinse their own mug

Empty garbage pail in community room and kitchen and take to dumpster in rear of parking lot

Replace garbage pails with clean garbage bags

Thank you, Thank you.....rest easy knowing you won't be asked to do this again for many months!
