Pastor's Column:

Eventually, all things merge into one, and a river runs through it. The river was cut by the world's great flood and runs over rocks from the basement of time. On some of the rocks are timeless raindrops. Under the rocks are the words, and some of the words are theirs. --Norman MacLean, A River Runs Through It.

We are all connected. This has never been more apparent than in the past few weeks in the aftermath of hurricane Katrina, which is surely the worst natural disaster in America during my lifetime. I am constantly amazed and touched by the stories told by the evacuees and their rescuers, along with the outpouring of help coming from every sector of our country and our world. By now we probably all know at least someone who has gone personally to volunteer in the south, or who has provided money, supplies or housing for those in need.

Now that residents of New Orleans are finding their way back to damaged or demolished homes and businesses, we hear more and more talk of how that great city will be rebuilt. I like the image of resurrection when speaking of New Orleans, because to simply replace what was there, with its poverty, racism and careless political decisions would be a social disaster even bigger than the one caused by the hurricane. What is needed is for the city to rise up out of the floodwaters transformed by the vision that many of us share, which is one of justice, compassion and equality for all the people who live there.

Our values as a community of faith call us to carry forth this vision, into the choices we make about how we set our priorities and spend our money and cast our ballots. We are indeed, all connected; and now we have this marvelous and historic opportunity to advocate for highest good that can possibly come out of the wreckage of a failed system, as we live out our UU principles. Let us be ever more alert to the greater possibilities that transformation and new beginnings offer to us and to our world.

Being a Unitarian is about exploring new ideas. We do that in our Sunday services, and sometimes in special forums. Certainly the film series and the lunch bunch are programs that encourage discussion. Traditionally we also explore and discuss new ideas in Adult Religious Education. The UUA assists in the development and distribution of specific curriculum for Adult RE; for other sessions, we devise our own. We have offered a few series over the past years, and we hope to offer more sessions and series in the future. Natalie Mendik has agreed to help facilitate Adult RE. We welcome her to the post, even as we congratulate her and her husband on the recent birth of their son. If you have any ideas that you would like to facilitate or to see discussed, please let us know. In this newsletter there is information on "Unraveling the Gender Knot", an adult RE curriculum that was developed by the UUA and will be offered here at ESUUC starting in October.

Being a Unitarian is exploring alternative religious practices. Our Sunday services are varied and often draw upon religious traditions other than Christian. Here at ESUUC we have begun a more systematic exploration of "pagan" practices that celebrate the Turning of the Wheel. Many of us find such rituals reinforce our connection with nature and with each other. Samhein in late October is the holidays that we initially and most often celebrate.

Being a Unitarian is being concerned with social justice. Social justice is often the theme for the Sunday service, and is addressed in RE. We now have the opportunity to work on social justice issues here in Murrysville, like working for the food bank. A group called UUs United for Faith in Action has been taking part in a series of social justice activities. This group from five UU congregations in the Pittsburgh cluster marched in the Gay Pride Parade and participated in an anti-war candle light service in Schenley Park. In the future they plan a rally for Dafur (Oct 6) and a showing of a Walmart expose. To connect with this group contact them at Jeannez49@cs.com.

Katrina Aftermath Donations Through the UUA

Our hearts go out to all those affected by Hurricane Katrina. The UUA has established the Gulf Coast Relief Fund. Our church will be donating all cash offerings on Sunday to this effort. OWL Sexuality Education for Grades 10-12

We are pleased to announce that the Our Whole Lives (OWL) Sexuality Education Series for grades 10 --12 will be conducted here early next year. Using a comprehensive approach, this program helps senior-high youth gain the knowledge, life principles and skills they need to express their sexuality in positive, life enhancing ways. Although this curriculum was developed by the Unitarian Universalist Association and the United Church of Christ, the text is completely secular and free of specific religious doctrine or reference. The underlying values of the program, however, reflect the justice-oriented traditions of both the denominations.

A mandatory orientation session for parents is tentatively scheduled Sunday, December 11, 2005, from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. Course materials and accompanying video will be reviewed, and written permission from the participant's parents is required prior to enrollment.

At this point we're planning for the 12 sessions to be held basically every other Sunday, starting in January 2006, from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m., at the East Suburban Unitarian Universalist Church on Sardis Road in Murrysville.

Unraveling the Gender Knot: Challenging the System that Binds Us is a new course based on the book, <u>The Gender Knot</u>, by Professor Allan Johnson, for Unitarian Universalist adults and youths and our friends.

Topics in the seven two-hour sessions include gender, religion, economics, invisibility and denial, and how to challenge the patriarchal system.

Participants and co-leaders:

- * Examine religious writings that influence our beliefs about women and men
- * Study how the patriarchal system shapes women and men
- * Identify and practice confronting patriarchal actions by organizations, other people, and ourselves

Participants learn that:

- * We are not responsible for our inherited patriarchal system, and we participate in it.
- * Paths of least resistance are easy to take and hard to recognize.
- * We can change our attitudes and behavior, and can influence others.

Barter Board
