We are blessed by being here together.

All religious communities celebrate both the Harvest and the winter season. We are blessed in that we can choose to join in a variety of such rituals, customs and celebrations. In November, we can join our neighbors in giving thanks for the harvest. I like to attend the ecumenical Thanksgiving service of the Monroeville Interfaith Ministerium. Celebrated on a weekday evening before thanksgiving, the service typically attracts a disproportionate number of ESUUC members as our denomination encourages such explorations to a greater extent than do other churches. Maybe I will see you there this year!

The earth-based traditions celebrate the seasons of the earth and they cycle of life. In the wheel of the year, we are settling in for the dark and cold of winter. Like other religious communities, we will begin to prepare to celebrate Light in midwinter. Here at ESUUC we will build an outdoor light labyrinth and hold meditation and rituals in it throughout the Holiday Season. Solstice, Christmas, Hanukkah—each of these celebrations is a midwinter festival of lights. These activities are outlined in other articles in this newsletter.

Another UU approach to the Holidays is to celebrate the seasons "simply." Over the past decade I have attended numerous Sunday UU programs that encouraged me to celebrate family and community at this time of year, and to not get caught up in the materialistic and commercialized aspects of Christmas. I think it is a good idea to spend more time in valued activities with family and friends, and less time and money shopping for presents. However, I also think there is value in sending greetings to friends-- some with whom I have a lasting bond, but who I rarely see, others here in the Pittsburgh area who I especially value this time of year. And I like to give gifts to express affection and appreciation to friends and family. So I prefer the reduced and intentional consumption approach. I try to cut down on the time and money I spend shopping. I take seriously the advice that my checkbook should be an indication and a reflection of my values. I try to make generous contributions to community agencies that are working for social justice or serving the community. I try to make some gifts. I also spend my money as if it were votes. I never vote for Walmart, and rarely for Target, Kohl's or Penney's. Rather, I consume products that support local and international artists, and gifts that represent the human spirit of creativity. For example, shopping at One Thousand Villages in Squirrel Hill supports art co-operatives around the globe. Similar networks can be found online. To assist you in such efforts, we are offering for sale a selection of "alternative" greeting cards and peace calendars for sale after services each Sunday in November. The cards are from the Syracuse Cultural workers and include multicultural, global, peace, and eco images. We will also be featuring an artist exhibit and market on Sunday, November 13 after church (12:15-3:15). Each of these activities is seen as furthering the mission of our congregation, while at the same time raising some funds for our other activities.

Movie Night

The title may not be great but the movie is. It's about how we crash into each other in life. It's about how, just as the Course in Miracles says, everything boomerangs. It's about how what goes around comes around. It's about how all of our choices bring interesting results our way. It's about how hitting bottom can bring you back up again. It's about

prejudice and it's devastating consequence. There are 3 clear miracles in the movie on the order of what ACIM means by a miracle, namely the change of mind that someone must go through in order to start seeing things more clearly."

For the kids we are planning to show "The Point" - a great movie for everyone! (I love it!) This movie is 74 minutes long. We will show some short cartoons to fill in while the adult movie is still running.

The animated tale about the round-headed child, Oblio, born into a world where everything and everyone has a point, and his faithful dog Arrow, narrated by Ringo Starr and featuring the Harry Nilsson song "Me and My Arrow."

Singer/songwriter Harry Nilsson wrote and produced this touching animated tale in 1971, and contributed some classic songs for the soundtrack. The soft Liverpudlian lilt of ex-Beatle Ringo Starr narrates the tale, telling the story of Oblio: A sad outcast from the village of "Point." largely eschewed by the local villagers due to his round head. The adventures of Oblio and his trusty sidekick dog Arrow subsequently take shape in the "Pointless Forest," a wonderland filled with colorful characters and some enchanting secrets.

The film takes the viewer on a deeply personal journey into the every day lives of families struggling to fight against a Goliath. From a small business owner in Missouri to a preacher in California, from workers in Florida to a poet in Mexico, dozens of film crews on three continents bring the story of an assault on families and American values. Current and former employees, managers and executives will tell all about the corporation's inner-workings. *Wal-Mart* is based on individual human beings, all over the world, at all levels of society, telling their story in very personal terms.

UUs United for Faith in Action (UUUFIA) is concurrently hosting a public showing on November 18 at First Unitarian Church in Shady Side, which will include a brief presentation by two local groups and a discussion about the effect Wal-Mart is having on Pittsburgh and the entire nation. OWL Sexuality Education -non-Members invited also

We are pleased to announce that the Our Whole Lives (OWL) Sexuality Education Series for grades 4-5 and grades 10-12 will be conducted here early next year. Using a comprehensive approach, these programs help youth gain the knowledge, life principles and skills they need to make decisions about their sexuality in positive, life enhancing ways. Although this curriculum was developed by the Unitarian Universalist Association and the United Church of Christ, the text is completely secular and free of specific religious doctrine or reference. The underlying values of the programs reflect the justice-oriented traditions of both denominations.

We think our students will have better discussions with slightly larger classes than are currently enrolled in the RE program. For this reason we are recruiting students from outside of our own congregation, from other UU churches and friends of congregation members, etc. If you know of any 10th thru 12th graders or 4th and 5th graders who would benefit from the OWL program, and whose parents' views are likely to be consistent with UU principles and attitudes on sexuality, please let the parents know about these classes and encourage them to contact the instructors for additional information (or pass information on to us).

For grades 4 and 5 the parents should attend an introductory parent meeting at 8:30 a.m., Saturday, December 3rd to learn about the curriculum and to understand why sexuality education is critically important at this age. At the parent meeting we will schedule one mandatory orientation for students and parents and 8 weekly classes (tentatively one Saturday AM and 8 Monday evenings, starting in January).

For grades 10-12 there is a mandatory orientation session for parents, tentatively scheduled for Sunday, December 11, 2005, from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. Course materials and accompanying video will be reviewed, and written permission from the participant's parents is required prior to enrollment.
