According to Caitlin Matthews in the *Celtic Spirit*, the Celtic people visited groves and springs at the sacred times of the year and made the Turas. The word Turas means journey, pilgrimage and time and refers to the circular spiraling prayer and meditation forms used by the Celtic people as the walked meditatively around sacred sites. The meditative walk was always sun-wise, from left to right. This process of spiraling around "builds power, strengthens intention and brings us into attunement with our soul's thread."

We plan to make such a site here at ESUUC. A place to make the Turas, a place where we can experience "the turning of our soul toward …spiritual light." Join us on December 3 as we build an outdoor light labyrinth. We will conduct a labyrinth workshop and create an outdoor light labyrinth, on Saturday,

December 3. The workshop will be held 12:00 to 4:30, followed by light refreshments. Please help us toward this goal by collecting plastic milk and juice jugs.

One source of meditation appropriate for the season is to contemplate an answer to the question "What do you want this year." True wants are not those easily satisfied by pretty wrapped presents. Join us on December 3 for a labyrinth meditation on *The Gifts We Really Want*. We will conduct our first lit meditation that evening after dark (5:30?).

An exhibit entitled "Eastern Religions Come to Western Pennsylvania" is being shown all semester in the Sutton Hall Museum and in Kipp Art Gallery at Indiana University of PA (IUP).

#### Tour: People and Places of the Civil Rights Movement

Some of the places of the civil rights movement are readily accessible: the Edmund Pettus bridge in Selma, 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, the church whose burning drew Chaney, Schwerner and Goodman to Philadelphia, Mississippi. But fewer and fewer of the people who gave such places their meaning survive to talk with us. Both places and people are included in a tour being offered in March of 2006 by Meadville Lombard Theological School.

The March 18-26 tour has been planned and will be led by the Rev. Dr. Gordon Gibson, who was involved in the early stages of the 1965 Selma voting rights campaign and was the Unitarian Universalist minister in Mississippi 1969-84. He led similar tours in 2004 and 2005.

The tour, by luxury motor coach, will include all admission charges, overnight accommodations, and most meals in the \$1,000 cost. Visits with 1960s activists and videos on the bus will supplement the site visits. The tour will begin and end in Chicago, Illinois.

Registration is on a first-come basis with some of the 30 seats reserved for theological students who will be taking this as a credit course.

A participant in the 2004 Tour said, "the stories from the folks who were 'in the trenches' make the Movement come alive." Another participant described it as "seeing the Movement through the real experiences of real people."

## OWL Sexuality Education -non-Members invited also

We are pleased to announce that the Our Whole Lives (OWL) Sexuality Education Series for grades 4-5 and grades 10-12 will be conducted here early next year. Using a comprehensive approach, these programs help youth gain the knowledge, life principles and skills they need to make decisions about their sexuality in positive, life enhancing ways. Although this curriculum was developed by the Unitarian Universalist Association and the United Church of Christ, the text is completely secular and free of specific religious doctrine or reference. The underlying values of the programs reflect the justice-oriented traditions of both denominations.

We think our students will have better discussions with slightly larger classes than are currently enrolled in the RE program. For this reason we are recruiting students from outside of our own congregation, from other UU churches and friends of congregation members, etc. If you know of any 10<sup>th</sup> thru 12<sup>th</sup> graders or 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> graders who would benefit from the OWL program, and whose parents' views are likely to be consistent with UU principles and attitudes on sexuality, please let the parents know about these classes and encourage them to contact the instructors for additional information (or pass information on to us).

For grades 4 and 5 the parents should attend an introductory parent meeting at 8:30 a.m., Saturday, December 3<sup>rd</sup> to learn about the curriculum and to understand why sexuality education is critically important at this age. At the parent meeting we will schedule one mandatory orientation for students and parents and 8 weekly classes (tentatively one Saturday AM and 8 Monday evenings, starting in January).
