Join **Sue Lau** as we will look at the themes that characterize this literary genre and at the symbols that lend it color.

There is a small but mighty movement within each of the old-line denominations that is pressing to include GLBT persons and clergy at every level of power, and to affirm gay unions.

It's amazing to me how this one issue alone threatens to split many of these worldwide church bodies right down the middle. When people line up on one side or the other, some will say, "Oh, we just CAN'T split the church!" (This translates as some form of idolatry, I think.) And there are others who will say, "But we have to stay together to show we are united in common heritage and ministry (and church property, too)." And the same time they have the problem of reconciling (or not) the vast differences of opinion and theological perspective.

As we watch these various ecclesial foundations crumble around us, we UUs have a wonderful ongoing opportunity to live in gratitude that we will never have to split over this issue or probably any other. It will be interesting to watch, however, as a national UU task force tackles the issue of the Seven Principles, to see if any of them needs revision. I am confident that we will meet the test. It's a good feeling to know that we can encourage one another in our various beliefs and faith journeys and still move forward together.

On Saturday, January 6, the very first step to becoming a Green Sanctuary occurred when Dan Begg introduced the Annual Retreat participants to the Green Sanctuary Program. A Green Sanctuary congregation is one that lives out its commitment to the Earth by creating a sustainable life style for its members as individuals and as a faith community. Sustainable living is not about our material comfort (though these choices are an important part of the overall life style); it is about choosing to live in a way that nurtures life, builds relationships, and rejects material consumption as the sole determinant of happiness. There are five goals that underlie the program: \* To build awareness of societal environmental issues among UUs \* To generate commitment for personal lifestyle changes \* To motivate UUs to community action on environmental issues \* To build a connection between spiritual practice and environmental consciousness \* To build awareness of and rectify environmental injustices. At the Annual Retreat, a committee was formed to further explore the process for becoming a certified Green Sanctuary. Please stay tuned for more information! CSA (community supported agriculture) is a system in which members buy a share of a farm and receive that share in the form of freshly harvested produce on a seasonal basis. Misty Morning Farm's fruit and vegetable CSA will begin producing during an extended, six month season through the summer and fall of 2007. This is made possible through the use of raised beds, cold frames and greenhouses.

We will offer over forty different vegetables and fruits, grown using organic and sustainable methods. Much of our produce will consist of heirloom varieties, developed for taste and nutrition, as opposed to shelf life and shipability. Tree and vine fruits will be planted this year to be available for subsequent harvests.

Weekly delivery during the season will be via pickup at the farm or at specified drop off points in surrounding communities.

Several different fee schedules, based on family size and makeup, will allow us to accommodate many different lifestyles.

Members can choose to work on the farm in return for fee reduction. Senior discounts and deferred payment plans will also be available.

Misty Morning farm is committed to the belief that healthy, sustainably raised food should be priced so as to be affordable for any who value its many benefits. We are a non-profit corporation.

SECRETS OF HEALTHY
RELATIONSHIPS
March 13 thru April 17, 2007

### INTRODUCTION

Relationships are at the heart of every important moment in life. Yet many of us have little or no effective training in how to make those relationships feel safe and joyful. This nationally-recognized program will help you to grow and change in your own ability to guide your relationships *intentionally*, not to simply *react* as you learned from childhood experiences. The class will not be "group therapy," but rather "relationship education." It's exciting, interesting stuff!

#### HOW THE PROGRAM IS STRUCTURED

The six-week program consists of a series of two-hour classes, offered once a week. Each class looks at typical problems in intimate relationships, especially emphasizing the differing perspectives of both partners. We'll start with everyone reading the story of a real-life relationship situation. Then, through discussion, journaling, video and leader commentary, we'll "un-pack" the unspoken feelings, expectations and perceptions that cause the tangles. This is NOT a series of lectures. You will be personally involved, but in as private a way as you wish.

### THE "TAKE-HOMES" FROM THE PROGRAM

You'll end up with several important "take-homes" from every class:

- 1. You'll begin to understand the "**power struggle**," an unavoidable part of every long term relationship and the basis for many typical relationship problems, and you'll know that you are not alone in facing it.
- 2. You will begin to understand that *conflict* is not to be feared in a relation- ship, but that it is truly an *opportunity* for growth.
- 3. You'll begin to understand that love is not just a feeling. It's a verb.
- 4. Perhaps most importantly, you'll learn some valuable *tools* which, if you will use them, will help you work through and even avoid painful and repetitious scenes in your own relationship that all too often go unresolved.
  - Where there is flagging commitment, we'll give you tools to re-ignite it.
  - Where passion and romance seem cold, we'll give you tools to re-kindle them.
  - Where there is conflict, as there will be, we'll give you the tools to use it constructively.

### SOME BACKGROUND READING

These classes spring out of the work of Harville Hendrix, PhD, whose million-seller book, "Getting the Love You Want: A Guide for Couples," was reissued by Harper's in September, 2001

The class will be taught by **Dr. Linda C. Bazan**, whose private couples' therapy practice is at 5850 Ellsworth Avenue (see **www.therelationshipshop.com**). She is a certified Imago Relationship Therapist and a clinical psychologist. Her husband, Donald Gibbon, will also be part of the teaching team. He has also had extensive training in Imago Relationship Therapy.
