ESUUC Sunday Services

Sunday, April 1, 10:30am - "Rising to a New Level" - On this April Fool's Day we will have some fun looking at numbers and while we're at it, we will play the ESUUC version of "Who Wants to be a Millionaire?"—no fooling! **Dr. Waun** will lead the service.

Sunday, April 8, 10:30am - Easter Sunday-The season of Easter is an appropriate time to look again at the stories and metaphors that give meaning to the life and death of Jesus. What could this mean to UUs? **Dr. Waun's** presentation "*Telling the Story of Jesus for Today*" draws ideas from Marcus Borg's work on the "earlier understandings" vs. the "emerging understandings" of Easter, the early church and current religious struggles in the U.S. All children will stay in the sanctuary with the adults today.

Sunday, April 15, 10:30am – "One form of Duality" - **Pam Alexander**, local artist, author, speaker, dream interpretation instructor and Shake Your Soul leader, will speak about how we have been taught to see life as though there were two sides to most things... good vs bad, or good vs. evil, heaven and hell, positive and negative, us vs them, win-lose, etc. The "higher truth" suggests that maybe this isn't true. If we can approach life without the judgement that creates duality then we can relax into the moment and experience it without so much fear and resistance. Hopefully, this will lead us into a place of unity consciousness and peace.

Sunday, April 22, 10:30am – "Earth Day" - **Andrew Weber** will explore a religious meaning of Earth Day and how we can see the Divine in all existence. Andrew is training to be a UU Minister and is a member of Allegheny Church. He was a very important member of our group who traveled to Romania and Hungary last summer. He spoke excellent Hungarian, because he had spent a lot of time there working with Habitat for Humanity.

Sunday, April 29, 10:30am – "Amarillis" - Wear your dancing shoes as we learn how traditional music and dance build community in the spirit of our 7th principle. **Donna Isaac** and **Allison Thompson** from "Amarillis" will be here to entertain and teach a dance or two. They play fiddle and concertina, respectively, in an authentic old time Appalachian style.

Sunday, May 6, 10:30am - **Dr. Waun** will speak on "Faith Without Certainty" –from the book by the same name by UU professor **Dr. Paul Rasor**. As UUs, we have different ways of speaking about "faith" and "beliefs" because we have no set creed or required statement of faith to belong to our churches. Dr.

Rasor will be coming to Pittsburgh in November as part of a cluster event, and this program will help to prepare us for his visit.



Pastor's Column: Breaking Free

I recently attended a weekend seminar with renowned author/lecturer Marcus Borg who had a heard a story which he calls "The Parable of the Cows". A farmer had some cows in his pasture which was surrounded by a single strand of wire. One day a visitor stopped and asked the farmer how he was able to keep the cows contained with something so thin and small. The farmer explained that years ago, the wire had an electric charge that would shock the cows if they touched it. After a few weeks, the charge dissipated, but the cows didn't know this. They simply remembered being shocked by the wire, and so they never went within 10 feet of it again.

Borg's point was that the cows didn't even know they were being confined by something that had no power over them, and so it would have been really easy for them to rise up and break free. But they were the herd that was content to stay where they were.

In this month of April—in which we observe Passover and Easter—we have opportunities to reflect again on the metaphors of 'freedom from bondage" and "breaking free from the tomb".....whatever it is in our personal life or in the life of our "herd" that keeps us from expanding and growing and feeling free.

It could be a worthy exercise, as spring bursts forth around us this year, to test again the wires that surround our pastures and think outside the herd. Freedom! Freedom to think and to believe and to serve. Why.....that sounds almost like something a UU might say!

I exaggerate when I say chaperone, because except a few people involved in the night patrol, the adults did almost nothing except talk among ourselves while we watched and listened to the youth in action.

It is time to turn our attention to our own finances here at ESUUC. I think of our congregation in terms of shared effort to reach common goals. By pooling our resources: Time, Talent and Treasure we can accomplish far more than we can accomplish as individuals. One other thing that we learned from the other adults at the SACCON is that for a small congregation we are disproportionately more active than many other congregations that are 10 times our size. We are already making a big difference at many levels: the environment, our international sponsorship in Transylvania and Uganda, Social Action in Murrysville and the greater Pittsburgh area and our support of all Unitarian Universalists everywhere through the UUA and the OMD. We really need to be sure that we support ourselves financially, such that we can keep our excitement focused on making the world a better place for all of us.
