Sunday, April 29, 10:30am – "Amarillis" - Wear your dancing shoes as we learn how traditional music and dance build community in the spirit of our 7th principle. **Donna Isaac** and **Allison Thompson** from "Amarillis" will be here to entertain and teach a dance or two. 
Sunday, May 13, 10:30am – "*Materialism from an Anthropological Perspective*" - join **Cathy Serventi** and **Jenifer Trout Osborne** as they review Cultural Materialism, a theory articulated by Marvin Harris. Cultural Materialism predicts the structure of culture based on the method of extracting resouces from the environment. This theory offers an alternative to Paternalism being the proverbial root of all evil. Enjoy a different perspective on gender politics to contemplate on Mother's Day.

Sunday, May 20, 10:30 am – "*Leo Strauss and the Neoconservatives*" -- **Glenn Klepac** will speak about Leo Strauss (1899-1973), a professor of political philosophy at the University of Chicago. Professor Strauss taught his students to revere the values of ancient Greek philosophy. Modern neoconservatives including several members of the Bush administration credit Professor Strauss for promoting devotion to country and for his criticisms of liberalism.

Sunday, May 27, 10:30am – "Chanting" - **Bill Dunham** offers a service of chanting to remember the sacrifice of those who have gone before us. This services promises to be very moving and meditative. It will include drums played quietly and reverently. Bill's energy and voice are sure to touch your heart and create a wondrous synergy between us all.

Sunday, June 3, 10:30am- Dr. Waun and the Coming of Age class and sponsors present an intergenerational service where we celebrate the completion of the two-year program for these amazing youth. During the service, the COA youth will offer their statements of faith and hear words of

encouragement from their parents and others as they end their time of preparation and begin "coming into their own" truth and life focus.



Of COURSE we don't exclude anyone. Do we? We're Unitarian Universalists! We are open and accepting of all religious perspectives and beliefs within our congregation; except... well....can you think of anyone who might feel uncomfortable?

I can. Interestingly and ironically, it would be someone who openly reveres and follows Jesus.

As I chat with church members I am aware that there are folks (a lot of folks) who sought us out as a more rational alternative to the mainstream Christian church. Some have had a previous church experience that wounded them somehow and so they come here with painful memories and baggage from the past. This seems to be true—more often than not—for folks from a Roman Catholic background.

For people injured by the mainstream church, conventional Christian symbols, rituals and language make them cringe.

However, I have met other folks (a few folks) in our congregation who still love the basic truths of Jesus as the Religious Revolutionary who taught peace, justice and equality and compassion for all. They see him as deeply influencing the tenets of the Seven UU Principles that inform our values. These are some of the people in our congregation who quietly yearn for familiar church ritual, symbolism, language, hymnody and even theistic prayer.

I would like ideas from all of you as to how to help EVERYONE feel open and comfortable in our congregation. How can we be a group that lives up to what we say about being open and affirming to all persons, whether we are talking about religious beliefs, political views or moral questions and opinions, and how can we reflect this in our corporate life in a way that honors us all?

I think this is really important. I would like to think that our "Acceptance Barometer" reflects what we SAY we promote, in order for us to be credible and authentic. I welcome your comments.



mUUsings from the President by Matt Mathis

I spent last weekend with our Coming of Age class on their Boston heritage trip. Although the trip included many of the usual Americana stops along the "freedom trail" - the U.S.S. Constitution and Faneuil Hall - the high points were definitely at the Unitarian Universalist Association headquarters. We happened to pick the weekend that the UUA board was meeting, so all of the regular public spaces were in use. So we had a

behind the scenes tour of the offices, where we met many of the people who actually keep the UUA running. But best of all we met Bill Sinkford, the precedent of the UUA. He answered questions, and described coming to ESUUC to speak at the dedication of our new building.

It is interesting to note that we have nearly doubled our membership and quadrupled our Religious Education classes since that dedication! One of our other stops was the office of congregational giving, which processes pledges from congregations to the UUA. They printed our membership records going back over 25 years.

At the time I write this we are at about the midpoint of our own pledge and budget processes. Although the early steps of both processes proceed concurrently, the latter steps are sequential. We need to know how much you have pledged to us before we can draft our budget. By the time you read this, the main pledge drive will be completed. The draft budget will be presented at the June 3rd town meeting, and the final budged voted on at the annual meeting on June 9th. Please be sure that your all of ideas are included in the budget by giving them to Cathy Serventi or me or one of the other officers.

Uganda Update: Hanan's Scary Day

Our Ugandan friend Hanan Bulime who is the director of the African Rural Schools Foundation had a horrendous experience last month. He was using the ATM card that I had sent him from my bank to withdraw funds from a Kampala bank to pay some bills for the school when the bank security guards arrested him. The card that he was using had my signature on it and so they thought he had stolen it.

Hanan ended up in the police station trying to explain that he did indeed have permission from me to use the card. He asked the police to telephone me at home to clear this up, which they tried to do. Unfortunately, it was 8:15 on a Friday morning and the phone rang just as I was going out the door to do my morning walk. (Thirty seconds later and I wouldn't have been there to answer it!)

I could barely hear the voice on the other end, and I could hardly understand what it was saying. A man was shouting, "We are paleeseh. Do you know paleeseh? Do you know paleeseh?" (He was trying to say "police".) I confessed I didn't know what he was talking about, and I was going to hang up (thinking it might be a telemarketer from some foreign country). It never occurred to me that I was talking to the Ugandan police! Then he said the name "Hanan Bulime."

Well, that got my attention. The police officer told me they'd caught him with my ATM card. Did he have permission to use my card? "Yes, yes"! I said. "That's my friend".

I tried my best to clear things up, but even so, Hanan had to return the next day by 10am with 60,000 shillings as a fine (about \$40—almost a month's salary for him) and they also destroyed the ATM card.

Well, it took some scrambling around, but the church was able to solve the problem by getting a new ATM card through our bank, with Hanan's own name on it. He also has a letter that he will carry with him stating that we authorized him to use the card.

Hanan had never been arrested before and was quite shaken up by this ordeal. I was just grateful that I answered the phone that Friday because if I hadn't, Hanan may have sat in jail until the following Thursday, because I was going out of town. Whew. That was a close one!

Can UUs Be Known as "The Peace People"?

Next November the Pittsburgh cluster of UUs, of which we are a part, will be hosting a major peace event, to help us understand the challenge of having a new "peace" identity.

Last December, Unitarian Universalists in the United States adopted peacemaking as a study/action issue. The denomination will consider its position towards violence over the next four years. An antiwar stand would make it the fourth Protestant denomination to pursue conscientious objector status, joining the Quakers, Brethren and Mennonites.

Historically, Unitarian Universalists have agreed with the theory and practice of "just war," or use of force in self-defense to preserve the life of another person. However, they have also supported peace and disarmament in over eighty resolutions since the 1961 merger.

According to the Unitarian Universalist Association Web site: "We call on the teachings of Jesus of Nazareth, the Mahatma Mohandas K. Gandhi, the Buddha, Siddhartha Gautama, and the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Our principles are models for peacemaking yet we act as if violence is more effective than nonviolence in certain situations. As a religious denomination, we need to clarify our position and apply our covenant to affirm and promote the goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all."

At this summer's General Assembly, this issue will be addressed. We hope that the November cluster event will be timely and formative as we sort all this out. Watch for details!
