What I'm Learning From My GPS

In January, when I flew down to Florida to pick up the used car I purchased on EBay, I also bought a GPS (global positioning system) to put on my dashboard so I would be able to find my way back home. I have decided that I *love* having this very calm and friendly (woman's) voice in the car as my companion, to guide me each step of the way, wherever I want to go. And I *love* knowing that I will never get lost again! No more squinting at shadowed house numbers in the dark. No more driving around and around and asking for directions! This is great for getting around traffic jams, too.

One of things that is most endearing about the system is that it never scolds me for getting off track: overriding the directions to make a side trip to a gas station or restaurant, for turning to avoid road construction, or for making a wrong turn altogether. After the service on Sunday June 3rd, we will have an informal "Town Meeting" style discussion of all of the business at hand. Looking for "Assistant" Treasurer and Finance Committee Chairperson

HELP WANTED (unpaid, of course)

"Assistant" Treasurer: not an elected position

At this year's annual meeting, ESUUC members will be electing a new treasurer to replace our illustrious current treasurer, Cathy Serventi, who'll be stepping down after four years of hard work and dedication. Cathy's successor will likely be me (Chris Priano)...unless another member has a burning desire to be treasurer. :-)

In order to maintain a system of "checks and balances" with respect to ESUUC's finances, we've maintained a separation of the treasurer's functions since last July. Chris acts as "assistant treasurer," processing receipts and making weekly bank deposits. Cathy handles disbursements, along with all other treasurer's duties, including the majority of recordkeeping.

We need a new assistant treasurer, beginning in July. This is a great way to learn the ins and outs of how ESUUC's finances work, while fulfilling a function that ensures a smooth day-to-day operation of the church. Requirements are 1) regular attendance at Sunday services, 2) fanatical attention to detail/accuracy, and 3) a commitment to making a weekly bank deposit every Monday (Tuesday, if Monday is a holiday). Training cheerfully provided.

Also starting in July, we need someone who can take over as chair of the Finance Committee. Duties include presiding over at least two meetings a year: one in May to develop/review the budget for the following fiscal year, and another in July/August to conduct an annual review of the church's financial records and recordkeeping procedures. We really can't have the treasurer chairing the committee that's supposed to be overseeing the treasurer. So please help!

Now, More Than Ever: Keep Recycling Paper

Abitibi has informed us that if we recycle eight tons of paper between May and August, we'll win \$200 in addition to our normal "payout." Spring cleaning is a great time to get rid of old papers. Please bring them to church and deposit them into the green & yellow bin at the back of our parking lot. In addition to helping the environment, it's an easy way for ESUUC to earn some extra money.

What we CAN recycle: catalogs, magazines, newspapers, junk mail, office paper, fax paper, notebooks, folders. Shredded office paper in clear plastic bags is acceptable. Soft-cover books can be recycled as-is. With hardcover books, please remove and discard the covers first

What we CANNOT recycle: cereal boxes, chipboard, milk cartons, soda cartons, or food cartons. These items cannot be used to make newsprint. This is considered contamination and may ruin an entire load of material.

** IMPORTANT ** I called Abitibi and asked them about phone books. Even if we remove the covers and binding adhesive first, phone book paper is unacceptable. Since it's already been recycled so many times, it typically turns to mush. So no phone books!! Abitibi did tell me that IKEA in Robinson Twp. has a bin where phone books can be deposited. Also: no cardboard.

Global Connections: Transylvania Update

We received lovely Easter and Mother's Day greetings from Rev. Alpar Kiss, the pastor of our sister congregation in Kopec, Transylvania. We now have some photos that Rev. Kiss sent to us, and they will be on display on the bulletin board beside the furnace room.

Global Connections: Uganda Update

The final few contributions have been received toward the purchase of the last two acres of the 5-acre plot needed for the school we are building in the jungle east of Kampala. The closing for the land will be on June 15. Future contributions will go toward the actual building costs and school development. The Pen Pal letters that were sent to the States in April from the African children were delayed or lost, we're not sure which. It could be that they were mistakenly sent "the slow way" (which probably means "by boat"). So Director Hanan Bulime quickly asked the African children to write more letters that he then sent "the fast way" at the end of May. We hope the American children all receive their letters before school is out for the summer! Dr. Waun now has three people going with her to Uganda to dedicate the new school in January, including a UU high school youth and a retired couple from North Carolina.

UU Regional History Project - Stories Needed
