#### ESUUC Sunday Services

**Sunday, September 3, 10:30 am** – "*ESUUC Picnic in the Park*" - Please join us for the annual Potluck Picnic at Bear Hollow Park (in Heather Highlands)! Come at the usual time for a short service from Rev. Waun, then stay and picnic to your heart's content. . We will begin with a chalice lighting, sharing our joys and concerns and a "*Common Bowl Discussion*" on the theme of Work (a Labor Day theme) led by **Dr. Waun** in the pavilion.

Please bring any meat you wish to grill and a dish to share. More can cook at one time if a few of us bring grills and what's needed for that. There are only 2 or 3 (unwashed) grills on site.

As we are trying to be more environmentally conscientious, please bring your own plates, utensils, and cups, which can then be bagged to be washed at home. Back-ups will be available, as we don't plan to make anyone go hungry due to lack of such.

Drinks and ice and tablecloths will be provided. Soap for hand washing will be at the small water fountain.

Nets and buckets and shoes suitable for water are suggested for the children who may wish to play in the stream.

From the south: Heather Drive is 0.9 miles from the Sardis/Old 22 intersection. Turn Left.

From the north: Heather Drive is 1.4 miles from School Road, go carefully as it sneaks up on you around a bend in the road. Turn Right.

From Heather Drive, turn Right at the "T" onto Forbes Trail Drive.

Take the first Left onto Trouthaven. Follow that all around and up the hill until you see the park gate on your Right. Turn there.

If you come to the stop sign, you've gone about 1 house too far. The gate is right next to a lovely blue shaded pine tree.

There are little brown signs for the park all along the route. Follow those.

**Sunday, September 10, 10:30 am** – "Fabulous Forty Kickoff"- this is our annual Water Communion service but it will also be the kickoff Sunday for the fortieth anniversary celebration of East Suburban UUC, which was chartered in October 1966. **Dr. Waun** and Commissioned Lay Leader **Nancy Fitzgerald** (Anniversary Chair) will co-officiate. Remember to bring a small vessel of water from your summer adventures for the ritual.

**Sunday, September 17, 10:30 am** – "East Suburban UU Church's History-Gram!" - Come add your (his/her)story in East Suburban, whether it's brand new or well seasoned. This history-gram program, led by **Brien Palmer** and **Nancy Fitzgerald**, solicits stories and your place in the line of friends and members. What about our church is part of you?

**Sunday, September 24, 10:30 am** – "*The Gospel of Thomas*"- In 1945, the complete Gospel of Thomas was found in Egypt. It has been described as "arguably the single most important Christian archaeological discovery of the twentieth century." We'll look at the circumstances of its finding, along with its implications for the understanding of early Christianity.

The speaker today is **Sue Lau**, our favorite visiting Biblical scholar. She has a Ph.D. from the University of Pittsburgh, in a program that is operated in conjunction with Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. She has taught in the Religious Studies Department at Pitt, at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, West Virginia University, and Chatham College.

**Sunday, October 1, 10:30 am** – "*Launching a Coming of Age Year*"-Another wonderful group of youth is entering the Coming of Age program on this Sunday. **Dr. Waun and the Religious Education department** will facilitate this important intergenerational kick-off service.



## Pastor's Column:

## The Importance of Feeling Connected

Since my last pastor's column, I was without a computer for two weeks as a result of a complete system crash. I had backed up many of my important documents (not as recently as I would have preferred) but at least I had enough to get me started again, even though the new system I bought made me feel like I was in someone else's kitchen trying to cook a 6 course meal when I didn't know where anything was any more. All the familiar appliances, utensils, gadgets pots and pans were gone, so I had to learn and adapt—and fast!

The email files were another story. I had backed up my email address book as recently as three weeks prior to the meltdown, in addition to all my email folders—folders that contained messages, receipts, travel plans, information, letters, conversations, etc. from the past two years.

After I replaced my computer system I inserted the email backup disc and it wouldn't transfer in because I now had the newer version of my browser, but I was able to go to the website and download the older version that I had before. Then when I inserted the disc, the familiar icons appeared, but all the files came over "empty". Nothing. Nada. Zilch. Gone.

That is the moment when I had the biggest sinking feeling of the whole ordeal, because I suddenly felt disconnected from all of those friends, colleagues and family members whose addresses had been in my

computer. It was a terrible feeling, but at the same time it showed me in a powerful way how important it is to feel connected to the people I care about. Just knowing that those names and addresses were at my fingertips helped me to feel anchored in my relationships, and now I will have to find a way of retrieving and reconnecting them all. It will take time, but such a worthy effort to regain that sense of security again. I didn't realize how much I valued that until it was gone.

During the summer when we are not seeing each other every week in church we may likewise have felt like we were cut off from some of our important relationships. Unlike the computer situation, however, we know that we will be able to reconnect as soon as everyone returns again from our summer adventures. That's nice to know! Sept. 10 is Startup Sunday; the perfect occasion to re-form our community!

## m U Usings from the President: by Matt Mathis UU University

The General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association was preceded by UU University, a training session for congregational leadership designed to strengthen and improve the overall leadership across the entire denomination. This year they had 3 tracks covering 3 broad areas: membership; conflict resolution and decision making; and stewardship. I split my time between the first two tracks.

The UUA has made growth a priority across the entire denomination. It turns out that many congregations self regulate their sizes. When the services get too crowded they stop encouraging visitors, rather than addressing the difficult issues of building renovations or creative scheduling. Although we seem to be doing fairly well in this area, there are some things that that we can tune up to better attract and retain new members.

In the decision making track we reflected on congregations as emotional systems, and how the styles and attitudes of leaders interact with the mood of the members to influence the decision making process. Today, nearly all Unitarian Universalist congregations prefer to make decision by consensus whenever possible. Doing so requires us to focus on the common aspects of our views and to listen to and understand the more subtle parts of our differences. Emotions such as excitement, fear and frustration tend to be contagious, and can have a profound impact on how a church grapples with a difficult decision, such as embarking on a major renovation.

I cannot really do justice to the UU University in a couple of paragraphs. Just by itself, it made my trip to the General Assembly in St Louis worthwhile. I hope we can send more people to future UU Universities.

For some reason, everyone seems to be extra busy this year. I know I am. As a congregation, people have expressed interest in many projects in the church and around our community. I have already observed that everyone is so busy that we are having trouble scheduling the fun stuff, much less working for good of the church. I am looking for an easy way to match people with just a little spare time with some of the little tasks (ok chores) that need to be done, to help our congregation thrive. Our agenda has to match the level of

effort that you, our members are willing to contribute. The more fair and efficient we are at doing the little things, the more effort we will have available for doing the real work of our church.

#### Transylvania Travelers

Our group of nine Unitarians has returned safely from our Transylvanian pilgrimage, seeking the historical roots of Unitarianism and visiting our partner church in Kopec, Romania, with pastor Rev. Alpar Kiss. The nine travelers were from four UU churches. Those from ESUUC were Marylyn Devlin, Nancy Fitzgerald, Jean and Bob Robl, David Whaley and Renee Waun. Others were from Allegheny UU, Sunnyhill and Wheeling.

On Sunday, August 6 the group worshipped with our partner church in Kopec and presented the banner that our children made for them. Rev. Waun preached alongside a Hungarian translator. She got to wear a Transylvanian preaching cape and was presented with flowers before entering the church. This was the first clergywoman ever in the pulpit in Kopec (over 400 years)!

We will have lots of stories to tell in a service and Transylvanian lunch being planned for Nov. 5.

#### RE Classes Resume!

RE classes for the 2006 to 2007 Church year will begin on Sunday Sept. 17. This year's theme is World Religions. Curriculum for each group has been chosen with this theme in mind.

Curriculum for the Elementary Group (4 years old through 3rd Grade) is "Timeless Themes – Stories from the Hebrew and Christian Bibles". Introduces religious literature central to North American culture and UU heritage. Children become familiar with their cultural heritage, and human issues that inspired scriptures: timeless themes of transcendent power, human responsibility, love of freedom, speaking out against injustice, respect for the beliefs of others, love of one's neighbor, and forgiveness.

For the Middle Group (4th through 7th Grades) "God Images". Engages children in their own religious quests. Allows for personal decision making through discussion and creative activity. Presents God images derived from Jewish and Christian traditions, world religions, and modern science.

The Coming of Age Group (8th and 9th Grades) will study world religions using a curriculum called "Neighboring Faiths". Helps youth learn about their own Faith and other faith traditions through interactive experience such as field trips and interviews. These encounters with other religions are given meaning through periods of reflection and discussion about Unitarian Universalism and personal beliefs and values.

We are continuing our "Way Cool Sunday School" format this year. With a few exceptions, this means that every 1st Sunday is Children's Chapel. All kids except those in Nursery attend. 2nd and 3rd Sundays of the month are classroom. 4th Sunday is spent on a service project. All kids except those in Nursery attend. (Last year we made hats and scarves that we donated to children's and youth services.) We are always looking for ideas on projects for all ages. Please share any you have! 5th Sundays are either for Arts & Crafts or a continuation of the Service Project.

#### Service Project Help and Donations Needed

For this year's RE service project, we are planning to make blankets for donation to Project Linus. This is a non-profit organization that collects and distributes blankets to children, infants through teens, who are seriously ill or going through a traumatic time. This organization has a local office that donates to various organizations in Westmoreland County. Blankets can be knitted, crocheted, sewn, made from fleece. Various sizes are needed (22" X 22" for preemies; 36" X 36"for babies; 36" X 45 " for small children; 40" X 60 " for older children; 48" X 72" for teenagers. We plan to make blankets from double sided fleece, and to do as much as we can on a no-sew basis. Large cuts of fleece can easily be turned into a blanket with some simple cutting and tying. Smaller pieces can be cut and tied, or sewn together.

In order to make this project a success we need some adult helpers on service project Sundays, and we need fleece. Please check your schedules and let me know (redirector@esuuc.org) if you can help. The first service project Sunday will be on Sept. 24! Do you have extra fleece, maybe some that has been sitting around your house for a while (like I have in mine!)? Would you like to donate it for this very worthwhile project? We will gladly accept!

#### **SUNDAY REFRESHMENTS**

(Also posted on the bulletin board in the kitchen)

What to Buy (plan on about 30 adults and 15 children of various ages)

-juice

-whatever kind of snack you would like to serve (examples are: nuts, bagels, muffins, fruit, vegetables, breads, cheese, crackers, cookies, mini quiches). It's really your decision to serve what you want or like.

#### Feel free to use the oven

#### **Setting Up**

The table in the community room should have:

Coffee mugs

Styrofoam hot cups

Creamers

Sugar/sweetener

Plate/spoon to stir coffee

Assorted teas

Paper plates

**Napkins** 

Juice cups

HOT WATER—there is a smaller/older coffee pot, fill half way with water and plug into outlet near the serving table in the community room. Start hot water before service begins

COFFEE---start coffee around 11am (takes about 1 minute per cup to brew). Use same outlet in the community room

To make 35 cups use 2 ½ cups of coffee

To make 30 cups use 2 cups of coffee

To make 25 cups use 1¾ cups of coffee

# Unless it is around a holiday or special event, 25 cups of coffee is plenty

Basin of hot water—In an effort to be nicer to the planet we are trying to use coffee mugs rather than paper cups. Fill the white dish basin in the sink with hot "soapy" water. Individuals using mugs can then rinse their own mug after using.

#### Clean Up

### Wash coffee pot and put away

Empty coffee pot with hot water and put away
Put away unused cups, plates, napkins
Put away teas, sugar, creamers
Wash, dry and put away any bowls, dishes or silverware you may have used
Nudge all those who used ceramic mugs to wash and rinse their own mug
Empty garbage pail in community room and kitchen and take to dumpster in rear of parking
lot

Replace garbage pails with clean garbage bags
