#### ESUUC Sunday Services

**Sunday, March 2, 10:30 am** — "*A Tale of Two Christianities*"-- There are many Christians among our neighbors, families and friends. But the label of "Christian" has such a broad spectrum of meanings, we can't possibly determine what a person believes until we engage them on some basic questions and issues. **Dr. Waun** will reflect on the idea (inspired by Marcus Borg) that there are two very different types of Christianity

**Sunday, March 9** – "*Our Unitarian U.S. Presidents*" -- Politicians who talk about our nation's "Christian roots" often neglect to mention those founders who worshipped in a more freethinking tradition. **Brenda Shiring** will discuss two of the United States's Unitarian founders – and presidents – Thomas Jefferson and John Adams, and their contributions to civil and religious liberty.

**Sunday, March 16, 10:30 am** – "*Where Have All the Pacifists Gone?*"— Merle Wenger, a frequent speaker at his Harrisonburg Unitarian Universalist Church in Virginia, will address the apparent lack of interest in organized war protest compared with the Vietnam War.

**Sunday, March 23, 10:30 am** – "*Easter: Keeping Love Alive*" — Easter is about the triumph of love. Sometimes we find ourselves in situations where it is really difficult to love the "other", or where loving could lead to pain or sacrifice. It could happen with a family member, a spouse, a colleague, a child. What is required of us as we dig for the inner strength to keep love alive? Dr. Waun will share some of her insights. There will be a children's Easter egg hunt after the service.

**Sunday, March 30, 10:30 am** – "*Dreams of Hope*"- GLBT Youth and Friends, including our own Rayna Faigen, will perform several skits concerning social issues. Discussion will follow. Matt Mathis and Susan Goodis will facilitate.

**Sunday, April 6, 10:30 am** – "*Waiting to Touch Down in the Land of Oz*" — Did you ever have the feeling that you are in a situation—like Dorothy was—spinning around and around in her house, seeing scary things out of the window and wondering when it will all come back to the safe place you always knew it was? Dr. Waun will help us to hang on and ride it out.

# Parking Lost Plan

Members, friends, visitors...lend me your ears (and your shovels, rakes and muscle, too).

We all know the church parking lot is in need of improvement, to put it mildly. Money that had been earmarked for a better parking lot had to be reallocated recently to purchase the new RE wing furnace. After consulting with board members (and others who've been previously involved with parking lot maintenance), here's our game plan:

First of all, we've contacted our snowplowing contractor, Daugherty Enterprises, who (going forward) has kindly agreed to clear the lot from side to side, rather than pushing all the gravel down towards the creek. They'll also begin to salt the lot. However, they'll only automatically plow/salt if we need the lot cleared for Sunday service. If you have something going on at church on another day of the week, and snow removal is required, please call Daugherty Enterprises directly at 724 325-2211, to arrange for plowing. Remember: We don't currently have a facilities manager monitoring the church calendar and arranging for additional snow plowing when needed.

Of course, the most desirable option would be a paved lot, but financially, that's beyond our reach at the moment. One of our members has proposed a more practical and affordable solution: installation of a french drain, in conjunction with grading improvements and placement of new gravel of a higher quality. This'll be a better, longer-lasting interim fix than just dumping more cheap gravel on to the lot. Plus, the job can be completed with volunteer labor.

The tentative date for actually performing the work is Saturday, May 3 (rain date the following Saturday, May 10). We have technical expertise available to us, but need able-bodied individuals to assist with the manual labor. If you're interested in helping, in any capacity, please e-mail Chris Priano at <u>treasurer@esuuc.org</u>, or call him at 412 848-5170. We also ask that interested parties try to attend a short planning meeting after service Sunday, March 16, where we'll outline the necessary tasks and finalize the requirements for people, machinery and materials.

To keep maintenance of the church from becoming a burden, we have line items in our operating budget to pay for a professional janitorial service, lawn care and snow removal. In addition, Laurie Montgomery's landscaping committee has done a beautiful job with shrubbery and flowers. Still, the church structure and grounds will always have unexpected needs and a few "big jobs" that we'll have to attend to ourselves. Several years ago, it was the roof, and look at the beautiful roof we have today, thanks to a number of dedicated individuals from within our own ranks.

One or two people can't tackle this parking lot project themselves, and we're not in a position right now where we can afford to pay a contractor to do the work. Having a messy parking lot isn't just an

inconvenient eyesore, it's also a safety hazard. So if you're tired of driving and walking through mud, please pitch in and help! Don't make me gravel - I mean, "grovel." All pathetic attempts at humor aside, the job won't get done if we only have a few people trying to care for this issue.

Let's give our church home the TLC it needs and deserves. When we decided to buy this property, that commitment extended beyond just making the monthly mortgage payment. Consider all the wonderful events that have been made possible by us having our own space.

<u>Goodsearch update</u>: ESUUC is now a registered charity with Goodsearch, the Internet search engine I described in my last column. You can download the Goodsearch toolbar onto your computer by visiting <u>http://www.goodsearch.com/toolbars.aspx</u>. (I suspect most people are using Internet Explorer 5 - 7, though there are some other browser choices available.) You'll be given the opportunity to select ESUUC as the organization you'd like to support. Then, every time you do a web search, you'll be helping to raise money for ESUUC, at NO COST to you. Example: a small charity (100 users), with each person performing an average of two web searches per day, would generate approximately \$730 in revenue in one year. Give it a try. (One warning: I had difficulty getting the Goodsearch toolbar to work on my computer. Leona Dunnett had no trouble at all, so I suspect the problem is specific to my cranky old laptop. It's growing ever more intolerant of the endless demands I make of it.)

<u>Abitibi update</u>: We've received another check, for just over \$20. Since the start of this fiscal year (July 1), we've made about \$74 from the Abitibi program, easy money for trash we'd only be throwing away. So keep that old newspaper coming! I monitor the bin from week to week, but if you see it's getting full, let me know, or call Abitibi directly: 412 279-3001 and select option 1 for customer service.

<u>In other news</u>: Hopefully, by the time you read this, the church will have a new refrigerator. We've had the money set aside for a while. Kudos to Nancy Fitzgerald and Maureen Lilly for their preliminary research. They were ready to purchase something months ago, but at that time, our cash flow wouldn't permit it.

<u>Finally</u>: A big THANK YOU to Marianne Jew, who's graciously volunteered to be my assistant treasurer. Marianne will be helping me by processing weekly collections and making bank deposits. This arrangement provides an additional safeguard for cash by assigning the receipt and disbursement functions to two different people. Please contact me with any questions you may have about pledge status and such, as I'll be continuing to perform overall financial record keeping.

### Global Connections

*Uganda*—Dr Waun and three other American volunteers had a successful trip to the African school, which we support. The one volunteer, 18-year-old William Delphia made a huge hit with the children with his video camera as he filmed footage for a documentary, and with his computer skills in setting up a network of little laptop computers for the children and staff.

Retiree volunteers Steve and Kay Martin brought skills in budget, construction and teaching. Steve brought American tools to work on the two-room brick structure we worked on, only to discover that the bricks, tools and methods are VERY different in Uganda. But we made good progress, with walls constructed all the way up to the roofline. Kay and Dr. Waun worked with Director Hanan Bulime on how to manage his operating budget. They also teamed up to present several hours of teacher training to the school staff, based upon Howard Gardner's theory of multiple intelligences.

Other highlights included trips to Kampala to purchase schoolbooks and supplies, first aid materials, and sample crafts to show to the craft teacher as ideas for our own craft making business at the school. We also filmed many interviews with local officials, teachers, students, parents and neighbors of the school, finding that everyone is raving about the quality of education there. In fact, the student's P7 test scores are in the top 20 in Uganda! We also identified 18 children who will now be given sponsorships by several new American supporters.

We also took one day off (it happened to be Hanan's birthday) to visit Bugigali Falls for a well-earned time of relaxation and picnicking. A trip to visit the newly purchase land called Trinity Campus had to be cancelled because there was an outbreak of some unknown fatal disease in the area, and health officials (worried about the possibility of the Ebola virus) had cordoned off the entire region after three deaths were reported. So that visit will have to wait until next time.
