(Note: at the recommendation of the Finance Committee, I'm no longer including the prepaid mortgage money within liquid assets. I'll continue to present it as an informational item instead.)

No, we didn't just realize an unexpected windfall. We saw our checking account balance jump thanks to those of you who got caught up on your pledge in time for the end of the 2008 tax-year. We're now sitting at about 53.6% of current fiscal year pledges paid.

The timing couldn't have been better, cash flow-wise. During December, we incurred a \$1,300 expense to have the line replaced from the gas meter into the back of the church building. The pipe was corroded just above the frost line and Dominion Peoples had warned us that it was only a matter of time before we'd have Page 2

to replace it. Fortunately, this expense was offset by just over \$900 that was left over from last year's service auction proceeds. As a result, the board had discretion to approve the expenditure of the remaining roughly \$400, thus avoiding the need for a congregational vote. Make no mistake about it: fundraisers help! We owe special thanks to John Graham and Mary Kukura-Straw for working with the plumber, Bob Susich, to schedule and complete this very critical repair.

On January 15, I e-mailed (or snail-mailed) members and friends a summary of their contributions to ESUUC during 2008.

## Ugandan News

Hanan Bulime, the Director of the Ugandan school Rev. Waun is visiting has worked hard to prepare for her trip there this month. He hired a brass band to march all around the surrounding area playing lively music and passing out flyers to announce the distribution ceremony for the mosquito nets. Their original goal was 1000 nets to protect the school children, their families, teachers and villagers. Lots of people contributed money for the nets, plus other folks who visited the AgainstMalaria.com website to buy nets designated for Uganda (but not specifically Hanan's School) had their money added to Hanan's total. So they ended up with around 1600 nets; enough to protect 3200 people!!

Rev. Waun and her 2 volunteers took four large suitcases full of clothing for the school children who live at the school. Most of those children have few clothes beyond their school uniform, so these items were much needed and appreciated. They also took two more One Laptop Per Child laptops and one IBM laptop (Rev. Waun's old one), plus assorted electrical supplies to network them.

All in all, they have quite a To-Do list while they are there and Rev. Waun will be eager to share her experience when she returns. Thanks to all who contributed toward the net project as well as used clothing for the children!
