**Sunday, April 12, 10:30 am** – "*The Saving Message*" — The April holy days of both Passover and Easter are based upon stories of salvation: being saved from certain death by extraordinary powers. What personal power do we each have in our own lives that is saving and renewing to ourselves and others? **Dr. Waun** will present.

**Sunday, April 19, 10:30 am** – "*Death as a Spiritual Event*"-- Pete McQuillin, of the Allegheny UU church, and Paul Cox, of the Unitarian Universalist Church of the North Hills present their ideas concerning spirituality and death. Pete is founder and Executive Director of Green Burial Pittsburgh, a non-profit organization that is working to establish a conservation burial site in the Pittsburgh area. Paul is a member of the Green Burial board of directors.

**Sunday, April 26, 10:30 am** – "*Summer Institute: Relax, Renew, Rejoice*"- Curious about Summer Institute, a weeklong "church camp" for UU's? Why do over 500 Unitarian Universalists flock to Kenyon College in Eastern Ohio each July? How can it benefit you and your congregation to attend? Amy Kent, a member of the Unitarian Universalist Church of the South Hills in Pittsburgh and the 2007 chair of the Summer Institute Planning Committee, has some answers that may surprise you.

**Sunday, May 3, 10:30am** - "*After-the-Fact Gifts*"-There are times in life when something "bad" happens that turns out to be something good after all. The trick is how to get through these times in such a way that

we can find the "gift" in there. It can be daunting but not impossible, and we can help determine the outcome by directing our thoughts away from fear and lackfulness. **Dr. Waun** will present.



I just heard an inspiring story once again. You know—the one about the parting of the Red Sea. I was at a Bat Mitzvah and the Torah passage for the day was the one where the Israelites found themselves between a rock and a hard place. Pharaoh had freed the Israelites from slavery, but then changed his mind and sent his army of chariots racing after them. The crowds ran up to the edge of the sea, but there was no escape and the army was bearing down on them. The people were frantic.

One man stepped boldly out of the crowd and—without looking back—waded into the water up to his ankles, calling to the heavens for help. Nothing happened. He then went in up to his waist, looking up for help. Nothing. He waded in up to his chest, then his neck and finally tipped his head back into the water and gurgled his plea for help. It was only in that moment the waters began to part and the people of Israel were able to walk across to freedom, after which the waters closed again over Pharaoh's army, drowning them all.

In my mind, the miracle of this story is not that the sea parted for the Israelites to escape and then came back together to destroy Pharaoh's army, it is that there was a person of such confidence in an unknown solution that he kept walking forward—risking his own drowning to bring it about. This story is about selfassurance in the face of challenge; hope in the face of hopelessness; unshaken optimism in the face of insecurity. Somehow this story struck a chord in me as I think about today's uncertain economic times.

May each of us find qualities of confidence, hope and optimism in ourselves and in our leaders as we walk forward together in anticipation of pathways that we may or may not have imagined would be there for us.

Oh!—and how handy that this story fits perfectly with our annual canvass theme of "Walking Together in Love". (See next article.)

# Green Clean By the Green Queen

Missed the last Living Green Service? Never fear! Our focus was what we wear and how we eat. The following are a few chemical-free recipes for personal care products all tested by the Green Queen's family. Looking for more? Check out <u>www.styles101.homestead.com</u> for easy to make shampoo, lotions, cleansers, etc.

**EXFOLIATE W/:** 2T natural yogurt mixed w/1T honey. Pat on face & neck - leave on 20 minutes. Rinse w/ warm water. OR TRY... 1T lemon juice mixed w/1-2T. sugar (make a thin paste), rub gently over the face (avoiding the eye area) - rinse w/warm water. Do not use on sensitive skin.

#### **HOW ABOUT A SIMPLE SHAMPOO**?

Mix 1/4c. of water w/ 1/4c. of pure Castile Soap (liquid) add 1/2t. light oil (almond, sunflower, safflower - cold pressed). Store in an air tight bottle (old squirt bottles are great for this).

#### **NEED A DEEP CONDITIONER???**

**TRY:** 4T. coconut oil & 2T. honey - mix in a small jar & heat for 1-2 minutes in a bowl of HOT water. Massage in & wrap head in a towel. Leave for 20 minutes - Shampoo out & Rinse. (do not use a lot of this or you'll look like a grease-ball - this recipe makes enough for at least 3 conditioning sessions)

**OR HOW ABOUT...** 1 peeled & mashed avacado + 1c. coconut milk. Combine & heat in microwave. Massage warm paste into hair. Wrap hair in towel or shower cap - leave in 15 minutes. Shampoo & Rinse. (This one is MY favorite; just make sure all the lumps are out of the avacado BEFORE you massage it into your hair!!!!)
