The Board has reviewed comments by concerned individuals, discussed things, and have decided to keep the side door of the building locked so that all persons will enter the front door, thereby giving us more visibility and control, especially during services. There are two or three volunteers who have offered to decided to use "new eyes" to be vigilant, but not fear-driven.

Even more important, however, is for all of us to use the "new eyes" concept to remember how it feels to be a newcomer to the congregation, and to make them feel as welcomed and as comfortable as possible as they visit our church. We will attract what we are looking for, and so let's be on the lookout for people seeking kinship and enlightenment, just like we are, as we begin this new program year together.
