Adult RE: "Spiritualism" - Led by Jay Powell

All Day Jay Powell Class on Spiritualism, Dec. 6

Those of you who remember Dr. Powell's Sunday presentation last April will recall that there was quite a bit of interest in his coming back to do an in-depth workshop with us. So now we have this on the calendar:

On Saturday, Dec. 6, from 10am-4pm, Dr. Powell will lead us in a morning devoted to the concept of Spirituality as a "non-local" phenomenon, and an afternoon filled with a series of activities such as sharing personal stories among the group and some focus activities on how to reach into our deeper consciousness.

<u>There is a limit of 15 registrants, with pre-registration required.</u> We will be using Chapter 5 of Dr. Powell's book as the basis for discussion. (See the accompanying registration form.)
