**Sunday, November 2, 10:30 am** – "North, South, East, West"- How has geography affected culture? In her many travels, **Dr. Waun** has made some purely speculative observations about people from the different hemispheres and regions and how cultural habits may have developed simply because of weather, location and topography.

**Sunday, November 9, 10:30 am** – "*My Cup Overflows—Chanting for Abundance*"-Experience Hebrew Chant! **David Goldstein** uses sacred texts, and simple, repetitive melodies to dive deeply into prayerful intentions. In the month of November, our thoughts turn to how thankful we are for the abundance we experience in our lives. In spite of the severe economic hardships we are having right now, we can still be thankful for all that is going right in each of our lives.

It happens that for the past eight weeks I have been filling in for an ill colleague of mine, teaching World Religions in a private high school in Pittsburgh. It is a school that believes poverty should not be a barrier to going to college, so it's quite a satisfying (albeit time consuming) venture for me.

What I am struck with is that most of the 12 eleventh graders in my class have had very little exposure to other worldviews and religions, and so getting presentations on differing points of view and belief systems is quite foreign to them. I come away feeling very grateful for the youth in our church who are exposed, through Sunday school and other programs to a variety of theological perspectives.

As UUs, we have a leg up on most people who find it difficult to empathize or understand other faith groups, even though the 21<sup>st</sup> century demands this of us, as never before. The Monroeville Interfaith Ministerium's annual Thanksgiving Gathering provides a time when we can follow our principles honoring the inherent worth and dignity of every human being and the interdependent web of existence of which we are all a part.

I hope that you will find that "attitude of gratitude" (I know, cliché, cliché, cliché) but nevertheless a worthy concept as we celebrate all that is right with the world and with our shared co-existence as people of faith. I hope you will join us on Monday, Nov. 24 at 7pm at the Church of the Brethren, 481 Center Road, Monroeville, 15146. If you have any questions, I would be happy to answer them for you.

# Order Holiday Gift Cards

Buy Holiday Gift Cards and help raise funds for the Coming of Age program at the same time! Order scrip by November 16 for delivery November 23, in time for shopping the day after Thanksgiving.

We are now selling scrip (gift cards for a huge assortment of retailers, grocery stores, restaurants, gas stations, etc). You buy scrip for stores that you already buy from and ESUUC gets a "rebate"! For example, if you buy a \$100 Giant Eagle gift card, you pay ESUUC \$100 and get a card worth \$100. We raise funds because we get the cards at a discount, which varies from store to store.

GREAT GIFT IDEA: if you give holiday gifts, order, buy, and give gift cards from ESUUC instead of buying gifts or gift cards from the retailers directly. Saves on shipping costs, and less stress on you :-).

If you do like to brave the malls or order "real" gifts from catalogs, they buy a scrip card from those vendors and use the scrip card to pay for your purchases.

Please try to participate - you don't have to buy anything "useless", and there are hundreds of stores to

choose from. Almost everyone buys groceries and gasoline on a regular basis, and if you would buy scrip from our church, it would help raise funds "painlessly".

With the world economy and the decline of the dollar, prices are high and many soldiers and military families in Europe find making ends meet difficult. To help, individuals and groups have banded together to send retail coupons, which can be used in PX stores. Even expired coupons can be useful, as manufacturers have agreed to redeem expired coupons (up to six months) from PX stores.

To help with the project, and give aid to our soldiers and military families, please bring in your Sunday newspaper coupon supplements, and place them in the box in the Community Room. (Of course it's okay if you clip coupons for yourself first; there will still be many left.) Then on November 30, bring your scissors and be ready to clip!

### Adult RE: "Sprititualism" Led by Jay Powell

Those of you who remember Dr. Powell's Sunday presentation last April will recall that there was quite a bit of interest in his coming back to do an in-depth workshop with us. So now we have this on the calendar:

On Saturday, Dec. 6, from 10am-4pm, Dr. Powell will lead us in a morning devoted to the concept of Spirituality as a "non-local" phenomenon, and an afternoon filled with a series of activities such as sharing personal stories among the group and some focus activities on how to reach into our deeper consciousness.

# Uganda Needs Help

A message from Rev. Waun:

The school I am working with in Uganda is experiencing a malaria outbreak. It is rainy season there, and the school is located in a high-risk area (actually the whole country is high-risk for malaria!)

We have sent money for medical expenses for the children, but now we are going a step further: providing insect repellent-treated mosquito bed nets for 400 children, staff and family members.

Just today I entered into a contractual partnership with an agency in London called the "Against Malaria Foundation" that has a large shipment of nets arriving in Uganda next month. They are reserving 1000 of these nets for our school ( Divine Foundation Primary School ), and they have set up a link on their website that connects to a page dedicated to our fundraising effort. Each net costs \$5.00. Our goal is to raise \$5000 by the end of January, 2009.

They make is very easy to contribute, as they accept a variety of payment methods online. There is also a bonus called "Gift Aid" from the UK government, which is where they add an additional 28% to your contribution amount (what a great government charity effort!) And it costs nothing to the donor!

I will be going to Uganda at the end of January for two weeks with some volunteers. While there, we will oversee the bed net distribution ceremony involving local health officials, and we will do some basic malaria prevention training as well. The whole event will be documented with video footage and digital photos, so everyone can see how the project turned out.

Perhaps you would be willing to donate one or more nets to this effort. You might know others who would like to participate, so feel free to forward this email along. Some folks are going to give nets in honor of special people on their holiday gift list, so that their gift makes twice the impact.

A flyer is attached at the end of this newsletter that explains the whole process. If you have any questions, please let me know. And thank you ever so much for whatever help you can give to these kids. We want to do our best to keep those itchy mosquitoes from attacking the children!

# Latest News: Malaria Outbreak, Bed Nets Needed!

As in many of the African nations now, Uganda is struggling to cope with the growing matana crisis.



At the school, more and more students are coming down with malaria—a disease that is preventable with the use of insect-repellanttreated bed nets. We have partnered with an agency in London called **Against Malaria Foundation** which already has a large shipment of nets on its way to Uganda. Our goal is to purchase 1000 of these nets to protect the children and staff at the school, plus the people and families in the nearby village. For each \$5.00 you donate, one net will be provided to a child or family member who is especially vulnerable during this rainy season. Deadline for online net purchase: Jan. 22, 09. **GIFT IDEA**: You might consider purchasing one or more nets in honor of special people on your gift list. What a great way to express your love in two ways instead of just one!
