### News from the Treasurer

General Fund: \$ 161,789.57 (including \$160K building and land)

Green Sanctuary: \$ 8.30 Labyrinth: \$ 60.66 TOTAL: \$ 170,167.06 Remember that ESUUC sells Great Lakes Scrip (gift cards) for many restaurants and retailers. We buy the cards at a discount and sell them at their face value. For example, if you buy a \$100 Giant Eagle card, the church makes a \$4 profit. For every \$10 Panera card, the church makes a \$0.90 profit. This is easy money for us and doesn't cost you any more than you'd normally spend. At the moment, all profit from Scrip sales benefits our Coming of Age program for church youth.

I'm still looking for an assistant treasurer to replace me after I step down the end of June.

### Imbolc Celebratory Ritual

On the Wheel of the Year, the next celebration is Imbolc, which is traditionally celebrated on the first or second of February. This is the day dedicated to Brigid, (Brighid, Brigit, Bride,) the Celtic goddess who in later times became revered as a Christian saint. Originally, her festival on February 1 was known as Imbolc or Oimelc, two names which refer to the lactation of the ewes, the flow of milk that heralds the return of the life-giving forces of spring. Later, the Catholic Church replaced this festival with Candlemas Day on February 2, which is dedicated to the Virgin Mary and features candlelight processions. The powerful figure of Brigid the Light-Bringer overlies both pagan and Christian celebrations.

At Imbolc we celebrate the beginning of spring, the first stirrings of shoots in the Earth, and the gradual dawning of the new light. It is a time to clear out old habits and possessions, to discover the child within ourselves, and to make new beginnings as we honor the Goddess.

We will be holding this year's celebration of Imbolc on Saturday evening, January 30 at 7PM. All are welcome.
