ESUUC Sunday Services

Sunday, January 31, 10:30 am – "*Personal Perspectives on Buddhism*"- Most of us have expressed an interest in Buddhism at one time of another, for its radically different approach, for its psychological insights, for its practical applications, or for other reasons. A few of us have the opportunity for exposure to Buddhism on a deeper level, whether from a personal engagement or from living in a Buddhist culture. Come hear some personal insights into this fascinating topic.

Sunday, February 7, 10:30 am – "*Music and Community in Western Africa*"- In the spirit of Black History Month, we are going to experience some West African music. This music is very much about community, celebration, and function or purpose. Much research has been conducted on the connections between African music and African-American music styles throughout history, and we will explore this. Our speaker-- Alisha Rosshas an MA in Ethnomusicology, concentrating on West African drum and dance styles of djembe and sabar, and has performed musicological research in Senegal in western Africa.

We will end our session with a good old-fashioned drum circle, just in the spirit of celebration. We will have a bunch of instruments available that you can all come up and feel free to try out, and let's just jam for our last few minutesno rules, no conductor. Just making music together, in the timeless spirit of tribal rhythm and community!

Sunday, February 14, 10:30am - (Valentine's Day) - "*How Dreams Come True*"- Just back from another trip to Uganda, **Dr. Waun** will talk about how an idea becomes a dream if we can focus our attention in a certain way. She will update us on the newly completed construction project and nurse's office for the school there, using photos and possible video clips.

Sunday, February 21, 10:30 am – "*Thomas Jefferson, Warts and All*"- He was a slaveholder, a racist, and a hypocrite who stood by while contemptible deeds were committed in his name. Yet he was also a man with a brilliant, wide-ranging mind, whose magnificent words and whose understanding of freedom shaped the best values of our nation – and the very standards by which we judge him. For Presidents' Day, Brenda Shiring will present the enigma who was Thomas Jefferson.

Sunday, February 28, 10:30 am – "*Introduction to Reflexology and Emotional Freedom Techniques*"-Both of these techniques are based in Ancient Chinese Medicine, but they have a somewhat different approach to healing. Deb Carter, a Registered Reflexologist Practitioner will explain the workings of both of these wonderful alternative healing techniques and how they can help balance your life

Sunday, March 7, 10:30am- "*No Sweet Little Ritual*"- Every UU service begins with the lighting of the chalice; a powerful symbol of our liberal religion. The story behind this ritual is very interesting and spans centuries of meaning. Dr. Waun will take us through the events that led up to the official adoption of the chalice as our UU symbol in the 70's. We will also welcome new members on this day.
