Sunday, November 1, 10:30 am – "Why Do They Hate Us So Much?" - There are parts of the world where Westerners can't travel any more. Pastor's Column: Caring and Sharing

Our congregation has always been a place of great caring and sharing with one another. Our Sunday Joys and Concerns reflect this, as we bring what is on our hearts and minds before the community of faith. Friends reach out to friends in times of special need. We also have a column in this newsletter, written by Susan Goodis, that lifts up caring and sharing notes each month. Now we are fine tuning how we do this important work in two ways:

- 1. Sunday Joys and Concerns—when it is time for this poignant ritual during our Sunday services, the facilitator will ask people with something to share to simply stand and speak from where they are, and the facilitator will light the candles. By sharing in this way, we will be streamlining the service to allow adequate time for the speaker of the day.
- 2. Pastoral Care Training at ESUUC -- —it has been noted that we need to rebuild our Pastoral Care Team. These are people who are trained to take phone calls of people in our congregation who are experiencing pastoral emergencies, to make hospital and home visits when needed and to organize caring gestures such as meal deliveries and occasional transportation. I am available to do these things, but as your part-time minister, we need a team of compassionate people who can help with these duties when necessary. News from the Treasurer

Following is summary financial data for the month ending 9/30/09. Now that we're using the web-based "Icon" system – which lets us do fund accounting – I'm reporting our finances in terms of the various fund balances (total liabilities and net assets):

ARSF: \$ 15.642.73

Chalice Lighters: \$ 1,330.00

Coming of Age: \$ 1,615.66

General Fund: \$ 159.876.51

Green Sanctuary: \$ 8.30

Labyrinth: \$ 60.66

TOTAL: \$ 178,533.86

The General Fund balance now includes our land + building as an asset, valued at its original purchase price of \$160,000. The General Fund's portion of the checking account is actually in a negative situation at the moment (-\$123.49). What's helping our cash flow is that ARSF is running a large balance, but that won't last forever as we continue to transfer money to Uganda for the school building project there. So please, if you're not up-to-date on your pledge payments, now would be a good time to get current.

Now that Marianne Jew has returned from handling some family matters in California, she and I will be spending time together to complete the treasurer transition. I'll be staying on until June 30, 2010 as assistant treasurer. If anyone with a head for numbers would be interested in assuming the role of assistant treasurer after I step down, please let me know. The assistant treasurer position exists to help ESUUC maintain a separation of financial duties, and to ease the treasurer's workload. For the most part, the assistant treasurer handles receipts while the treasurer handles disbursements and all other financial matters. As assistant treasurer, you're mostly processing weekly collections and bank deposits. With the Icon system finally in place, these tasks are actually kind of fun now, and much easier to handle than they had been in the past.
